THANKSGIVING and SUPPLICATION IN FOREIGN MISSIONS

Thanksgiving

1. The Superintendent together with the President and Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board visited Dr. Storer Emmett in Montreal November 11th and 12th. The Doctor was found in an improved condition following back surgery. He is convalescing at the home of his brother Peter in Montreal. Dr. Emmett gave a challenging report from the field and indicated his strong desire to return as quickly as possible. "It was more difficult," said he, "to leave Africa now for America, than it was to leave America for Africa over four years ago." Such is missionary passion.

2. That the Young Peoples' Association, in cooperation with the Foreign Mission Board is making plans to send Rev. H. R. Ingersoll, Alliance Superintendent, to Africa in March, 1965 to tour the Reformed Baptist Mission fields.
