YOUTH AND THE WORLD

Young people often ask the question, "what does the expression "The World" mean in the Bible? "What is it to be worldly minded?" "What did Paul mean when he said, 'Be not conformed to this world,?"

In the first place, this earth which we rest upon is the world — the Physical world. It is a wonderful creation of God. But, John 3:16 speaks of God loving the world. In this case the world means the human family. Now, these two references to the world are good. We should love God's creation and see beauty in it. We should never try to escape from our responsibilities to the human family or society in which we live. It was created by God for a purpose.

There is, however a realm of thinking which is called the world of **thought**. The Bible says "the world by wisdom knew not God." Worldliness in this sense is the exercise of our minds in wrong channels or avenues in life. When the Holy Spirit comes into our hearts our minds belong to Him. If we think on sinful things we soon talk like a sinner. If we talk in sinful ways we will also walk in them.

A young Christian finds no place for thinking evil continually. He sets his affection on things above, not on this world of vice, and evil. This reveals another meaning of the world, that is, the world of morals. The meaning of the word world here brings us face to face with two forces in our world which are rivals for mystery good and evil. Whether a young Christian will cater to evil morals or good morals depends upon his motives and the degree of control he has over his human urges.

Jesus was very clearly involved in a moral issue (what is right or wrong) in His temptation in the wilderness. His struggle was one common to all young people. It was a struggle between a sense of what is right and what is popular. Jesus would not allow His thinking to be conformed to that of Satan. If Jesus had comformed to Satan's plan He would need to break God's standard on other moral issues. It was against the spirit of antigodliness that Jesus fought. His followers can do no less.
