OVER 1,000 TRANSLATORS

The Scriptures have been published in nearly 1,200 languages but this amazing accomplishment does not mean that the task is finished. Today more than 1,000 men and women are engaged in Bible translation as the translation of the Scriptures moves ahead rapidly. A conservative estimate is that the Scriptures need to be translated into 1,000 additional languages.

Through the work of translators all the major languages of Asia, Europe and Africa now have translations of at least part of the Scriptures but the complete Bible is urgently needed in many of the languages of Asia and Africa. At least 300 languages in Africa need translations of the Scriptures. If we turn to Southeast Asia we find that from the Naga Hills in Assam in India to the tip of Vietnam there are many languages which have nothing of the Scriptures. In the South Pacific there are large numbers of languages in Indonesia, Melanesia and New Guinea which have little or no Scripture. The Bible Society is actively engaged in the work of translating the Scriptures but so much remains to be done.
