Dear Highway

Once again we bring you greetings from Rhodesia in the name of our precious Saviour. We do praise the Lord for the progress over the past church year and we continue to look to Him for the future of His work here in Rhodesia.

Our missionary staff is now up to full strength with the arrival of the Haywoods and Bethesda is looking like a small town. Each family is housed including Miss Chase and they are all doing a full time job of work either in the Hospital or school. We are very fortunate with the staff we have here in Rhodesia and we do thank the Lord for them.

Progress during the year; A church and parsonage have been built at Senkobo, Northern Rhodesia and there is a resident African preacher, one new preaching place in the reserve near there. In Southern Rhodesia we have three new preaching places making a total of four new outposts in all.

One of the biggest upsets of the year has been the break-up of the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland. We now have African governments in both Northern Rhodesia and Nyasaland. This break-up means that all the missionaries are resident in Southern Rhodesia which is now a foreign country as far as N.R. is concerned and it seems very probable that the Kiersteads may have to move to the other side of the river. This has been fully discussed with the other missionaries and I would request your permission to make this move providing (a) We are able to let the Mission House at Victoria Falls and (b) We use the money from this to let a house in Livingstone. This does not involve any sale of property at this stage, also there will be no financial burden as far as the Board is concerned.

This year we have over 700 children in our day schools and over 1000 in Sunday School. We have in our employ 20 full time teachers including missionaries and we receive salaries for all these from Government. The Bible is being taught to all these children every day of the week including Sundays.

The gains in membership are rather small this year as some of our members have moved away and we have lost track of them. We have however many more in schools and Sunday Schools and we trust that these will bear fruit for the Master. We now have a full time Youth Worker Preacher Elis Moyo and we have groups at most of our churches. The African Young People need your prayers. Satan is putting in a great deal of overtime these days. It is hard for these young people to walk in the Light of the Gospel. Do pray for them.

We have now been granted a church site at Jambezi and we are busy putting up a temporary building for worship. The McCall church at Chisuma is complete and Dr. Emmett has been having good services the past few months. As I advised the board some months ago we have been asked to start work in a new area of Wankie some 40 miles from Bethesda as the crow flies and 70 miles
