

### Question:

What is the "Ecumenical Movement" and what Should our Attitude be Towards It? Answer:

The term "ecumenical" means universal or world wide. The goal of the "ecumenical" movement" is organizational union of all branches of the Christian faith, Catholic and Prostestant. The dream of those who sponsor and support this "movement" is a World Church resulting from total union of all denominations and groups adhering to the Christian faith.

Viewing the proposed union of all Christian churches in its broadest concept, the merging of Catholics and Protestants, we must face the fact that the only world church the Roman Catholics are interested in is one that is made up of those who are now a part of that organization plus the "separated brethren" (the modern name the Catholic leaders have given the Protestants) who "return" to the fold.

A foremost official of the R.C. church in United States, replying to the question 'Should we try to convert good Protestants? declared:" . . the final objective of ecumenism, as Catholics conceive it, is unity in faith, worship and the acknowledgement of the supreme spiritual authority of the Bishop of Rome" (the Pope). The late Pope John stated: "Honesty demands that we let our 'separated brethren' know that this is our ultimate reason for participating in the ecumenical movement, and that we manifest it in practice by seeking to convert devout Protestants."

The union of all Protestants groups into one Church, could produce a politically powerful but spiritually impotent religious organization. This is the more immediate

danger of the trend toward ecumenism. It is a fatal mistake to conclude that the church will increase in spiritual influence simply by gaining in numerical strength. The union in fellowship and service of all who know and love the Lord is certainly desireable. Provided that such a union was based on scriptural principles and blessed of God, it would give the Church a united voice and witness in the world. But more organizational union of religious groups could weaken rather than strengthen the Cause of Christ.

It is "by one Spirit" that believers are "baptized into one Body". True Christian unity can only be achieved as born-again members of the Church Invisible are brought to-gether in a common life-stream with common beliefs and convictions. This could only happen on a truly universal and ecumenical scale through a worldwide revival. Such a revival we would welcome. Perhaps a more immediate goal for us would be earnest prayer that the religious groups adhering to the Wesleyan doctrinal position might be brought to-gether to give effective witness in the world for God and holiness.
