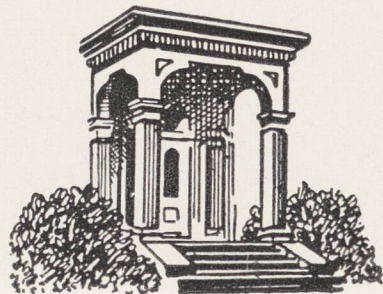


## FALL ENROLLMENT SHAPES UP

Applications and enquiries received to date (August 12) indicate that most classes at Bethany Bible College will have at least the usual complement of students. The first and second-year Bible classes promise to be larger than commonly and the total Bible department enrollment will be higher. A number of applicants have enrolled for the Christian Development Course. If the grade ten enrollment approximates that of last year, as it may, our total school enrollment should be higher than last year's (exclusive of the commercial class, now discontinued).

School opens September 16, approximately two weeks from the date of Highway publication. By acting now an applicant could still be received for fall classes. This is the last call for the coming term.

Trafton, preached under a divine anointing messages that were most helpful to practical christian living and service.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS

### AFRICAN CHURCH MOVES FORWARD

Encouraging reports come to us from our church in Africa. In the recent Alliance Meeting at Altona one man was ordained to the ministry: Jeremiya Mabena, originally from S. Rhodesia, completed our two year Bible Course. Mabena had a wife in Rhodesia who died a number of years ago, and

he has four daughters. He is married again and will be working for the present in the Altona area. Three were appointed to the position of Bible women, three babies were dedicated and eight candidates received baptism. Other appointments were made strengthening our youth and Sunday School work. Our district superintendent, Rev.

Charles Sanders writes — "I believe that, at last, we are tapping this resource of the African church, and if it keeps to its ideals it will bring forth good fruit in the future."

### AN APPROVED MISSIONARY SPECIAL

Rev. Glendon Kierstead is commencing his itinerary with the churches. The general board approves Brother Kierstead taking faith promises for missions in the local churches. This we believe will prove helpful in raising a minimum 10% for missions.

### EDUCATIONAL EVANGELISM

Our Bible School trains Spirit-filled national workers. Nationals can do more effective work at less cost among their own people. This is because of their knowledge of the customs and languages and because there are no racial barriers to overcome. Our aim is to consolidate and educate a strong missionary indigenous church.

### MEDICAL EVANGELISM

Hospital and clinics are maintained for those who are suffering physically. Many come for treatment. Here they also receive God's message. Many have been brought to the Lord as a result of these first contacts through the medical arm of the mission. Our hospital has 33 beds, but we often have double that number of patients. At the moment our hospital is urgently in need of funds for maintenance.

### MANAGEMENT

The responsibility of planning and directing the work rests upon the Department of Foreign Missions. The Mission Board consists of six members and the Superintendent. Three of the board are clergymen and three are laymen. The President of the Women's Missionary Auxiliary directs the activities of the local auxiliary and co-operates with the Prayer Band Department in encouraging daily prayer for the work. While extending a welcome to the four new men on the mission board this year we would also express gratitude to the faithful men whose term of service concluded this year.
