In early January we opened E. H. B. S. with a very good Spirit. There was a good number of students with the same faculty as the former year, who met that first School day to praise God. Our furlough had been approved by the Board for early May so our last term at the School was a busy one indeed.

Over Easter week-end we were present at the District meeting of the Altona Piet Retief Area. There was a very good delegation from the Churches in the District, and the Lord was present. Five new members joined the Church on the closing Sunday.

On April 19th about 350-400 people met at Altona for our farewell service. There was a good number from almost all our District Churches, plus many other folks from various Churches in the Area. Both the Chiefs of the Area were present and each expressed his appreciation for the work of Missions in his area. The service was chaired by Rev. Sibiya who is one of the Bible School teachers. We were given a love offering of about \$60.00, which showed to us what our efforts mean to the Bantu.

Bro. & Sister Morgan moved to Altona a few days after we left, to take up the duties of the Station, Bible School, and Clinics. Bill was the founder of the school, so takes up these duties with plenty of experience. Having served in this capacity for seven years, we know something of the demands, so would ask your continued prayer and support for the Morgan's in this field of service.

We enjoyed our ministry at Altona very much, and feel that we have some very wonderful people there.

On the 26th April we attended the opening of our Opuzane Church. Brother Gorman put much effort into this building. The Dedication was one wonderful service, which not only included the dedication of the building, but a baby dedication, a good number of members being received into the Church, and a communion service.
