TEENAGE DRINKING: IT'S SERIOUS

Phoenix, Ariz.—The growing seriousness of teenage drinking was spotlighted here recently in a statement by a Methodist minister and president of the Arizona Alcohol-Narcotic Education Association.

The Rev. Stanley C. Brown, associate minister of Central Methodist Church and association president, called for more public awareness and action on the problem which he believes is on the increase.

To back his claim Mr. Brown offered results from an anonymous survey among a cross section of 156 Phoenix high school students. According to this poll, he said, the beverage alcohol industry is having a high degree of success in making customers out of youth.

Among respondents:

104 said they drink occasionally, 19 drink often.

28 said they purchased alcoholic beverage at a package liquor store, and 25 said they made purchases at a grocery store.

51 ordered and drank alcoholic beverage in a tavern or restaurant.

112 attended "beer busts" or teenage drinking parties.
70 said they observed immoral activity among drinking friends.

54 admitted driving a car after drinking.

120 said they had ridden in a car with a teenage driver who had been drinking.

Contrast these statements from the teenagers with official denial that there is any teen drinking problem, Mr. Brown said. One national survey, he pointed out, says teenage drinking is up 270 percent in the last five years.

Mr. Brown attributed the increase to the home, insufficient education, lax enforcement of existing laws relating to minors and beverage alcohol, and community apathy.

He placed the home first, and cited these results from the poll. Among the 156 who responded, 104 said that their mothers drink, and 112 said their fathers drink. In 85 instances the youth said their parents allow them to drink at home.

Mr. Brown termed Arizona textbooks "extremely inadequate" on basic scientific facts about alcohol. Furthermore, he noted, "the teachers are not required to pass any examination showing that they have any knowledge of the subject. Our observation is that a majority of teachers do not consider the matter seriously. Many are too prejudiced in favor of drinking to teach the facts objectively."

He sharply criticized lax enforcement on the part of John Duncan, state superintendent of liquor control. "In all his years in this office he has not revoked one liquor license (for selling to minors) except an isolated case last spring, which was restored later," he said.

Mr. Brown gave several illustrations of community willingness to condone the beverage alcohol industry: 1) appointment of a beer company president to the Phoenix City Council; 2) saturation of homes and streets with beer and liquor advertising, much of it aimed specifically and subtly at teenagers; 3) abuse of the term "public convenience" in the liquor code in such a way that apparently as many liquor outlets are licensed as will pay the price; 4) the inconsistency of forbidding youth to do what adults make acceptable and glamorous.

"What right has any group of moneymakers to foist this crime against human welfare upon our communities and then call their business legitimate? It is high time we called a spade a spade and put some pressure where it will be felt."

We trust that this year's group of students will do as well as last year's group. School authorities considered that the results on Provincials last year were good in the light of the students' abilities and academic records. There were some students with complete passes and some who had passes on four of five required subjects. All in all, the record was satisfactory.

QUARTERLY MEETING REPORT
