For a number of weeks, Bethany students carried on with these services, which meant travelling about 150 miles. I thank God for the perservance of these men, for were you to travel that distance for a service and find only two people present, would you not feel like knocking the dust from your feet, and returning no more? But, they didn't.

Slowly, the work has progressed here in Ingomar. Today, we have a church and though it has only two tithepaying members, it is self-supporting. God has blessed, and done what was thought definitely impossible. A fine number now attend the afternoon services on Sunday, some who seem very close to the threshold of decision.

I am a Home mission convert. Each member of our church is a Home Mission convert. Is Home Missions worthwhile? A hundred times yes. I would not want to be lost and without Christ today, but I may have been. I praise God for what that little, white church across the road means to me. It's a lighthouse here and many of these blinded fisherman drifting on the sea of despair, are beginning to see the flashing of its Christian witness God is wanting to do great things. May the smallness of our faith not prevent it.

People are still crying, "Come over and help us." With greater trust in our God, who is able to do exceedingly abundantly above that which we are able to ask or think, let us reach out. I waited-I heard. People are waiting they listen in vain. Home Mission works are worthwhile! May God richly bless and expand this ministry.
