#### A BETHANY-MINDED CHURCH

When we speak of a Bethany-minded church we could be speaking of any one of several. The Old Town Church, however, may well be termed the Bethany church of the year.

Its Bethany budget was paid before Bethany Sunday. Even so — and rightly so — it made an all-out effort on Bethany Sunday. The general congregation, the Sunday School, the Young People's, and the Junior Church participated with the result that Old Town has raised the equivalent of two and one-half times its budget. (At the same time Old Town is giving ten per cent of its income to missions.)

There is another way in which the Old Town Church is contributing to Bethany. Five of its youth are now in attendance at the school taking the high school course. The parents and the church people are well pleased with the contribution which Bethany is making to their youth. They plan to send more of their youth to Bethany.

In yet another way the Old Town Church is standing behind the school. Old Town buys many of its religious supplies from the Bethany Book Store (hymnals, DVBS materials, and all) even though there is a good supply store in nearby Bangor.

Think of the possibilities of what sixty churches with a spirit akin to Old Town's could do.
