TEN COMMANDMENTS ON LIQUOR

I believe these ten commandments on liquor must be enforced for the hope of the youth, the country, and the future.

- 1. Thou shalt not menace the safety of our highways with your drunken driving.
- 2. Thou shalt not invade our homes with your radio and TV programs appealing to our children to drink liquor.
- 3. Thou shalt not control the power of our government, national, provincial, or municipal.
- 4. Thou shalt not lay upon the taxpayer the burden of costly jails, asylums, and penitentaries necessary to care for victims of your traffic.
- 5. Thou shalt not prohibit nor discourage education on the evils of alcoholism in our public schools.
- 6. Thou shalt not make orphans of our children through the ruin of parents addicted to drink.
- 7. Thou shalt not corrupt our international relations by debauching the representatives of our government.
- 8. Thou shalt not invade territories, cities, countries that have voted dry.
- 9. Thou shalt not support drinking parties and other liquor entertainment on the part of government office-holders with taxpayers' money.
 - 10. Thou shalt not destroy the homes of our people.

One of the glories of the Christian gospel is its ability not only to deliver a man from sin but to orient him, to place him on a peak from which he can see yesterday and today in their relation to tomorrow. The truth cleanses his mind so that he can recognize things that matter and see time and space and kings and cabbages in their true perspective. The Spirit-illuminated Christian cannot be cheated. He knows the values of things; he will not bid on a rainbow nor make a down payment on a mirage; he will not, in short, devote his life to spotted mice.

Back of every wasted life is a bad philosophy, an erroneous conception of life's worth and purpose.
