

If a person who is sanctified commits a sin, must be be saved and sanctified again in order to be forgiven?

Answer:

The people who embrace the Wesleyan interpretation of entire sanctification have been accused of believing in the possibility of our reaching a state of grace in this life where we are beyond temptation and the possibility of sinning. This is not true. The historic position of the advocates of scriptural holiness has been that we may be saved from the necessity of sinning, but not from the possibility. We may fall, but we need not.

One of the Bible's best statements on this particular subject is found in I John 2:1. In respect to the practice of sin the standard for the believer is clearly stated: ". that ye sin not". Greek scholars (Dr. Steele and Bishop Westcott) point out that the tense used here indicates we should not commit a single act of sin. It is not an exhortation against living in or returning to the practice of sinning, but an admonition to resist and reject temptation to a single

act of sin.

DEDICATION AT SALEM

A service was held in Salem on the evening of November 29th to dedicate a communion table to the Lord in loving memory of the late Samuel W. Burgess who passed away on August 15, 1964. The church was filled to capacity and the Lord was with us.

Rev. S. Hutchinson brought the message and a hymn "Come unto Me" was rendered "But should anyone commit a sin, we have One to plead our cause with the Father, Jesus Christ, and He is just . .". (New English Bible). Here the possibility of the act of sin on the part of the believer is recognized. Again the tense denotes the single act and not the continuing practice. One may fall because of the lack of watchfulness and prayer, and the merciful, meritorious provision of God, is already made to care for such a situation. Coincident with the act of transgression is the appeal of the Advocate and the presentation of his propitiatory or atoning merit in our behalf.

The penitent believer, conscious of an offence against His God and Father, must seek for a ministry of mercy and grace that bears witness of full restoration to the state of experience enjoyed at the time of failure or disobedience. We can only be justified and accepted as we seek the favour of God on the basis of light already received. "Remember from whence thou art fallen . . is the admonition given by our Lord. If one has known the blessing of full cleansing his soul will not be at rest until the witness of this state of heart purity is renewed. Full obedience and unreserved consecration would most certainly be required by Him of Whom we seek forgiveness and favour.
