

Founded in 1943 and operating under the Ministry of Religion, the academy is the top policy-making educational and research center in the USSR.

Officials announced that the first step would be to set up a special study group, including a number psychologists, to discover why children are attracted toward religion and what family or other influences tend to make them immune to atheistic indoctrination.

It is expected that the study group will conduct its investigations in several typical schools — three in Moscow and others scattered throughout central Russia and the tournout of children at Russian Orthodox church services every Easter, apparently think differently. They have ordered full cooperation with the program.

CONSCIENCE
