His was a thrilling story of a Christian layman who found his place in the program of God. Working along with Brother McDowell have been three Christian men of Grand Manan: Harold Tatten, Leslie French, and Frank Locke men with talents for various tasks.

Rev. W. L. Fernely, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, made a number of encouraging observations and announcements. Among these Mr. Fernley noted that our churches raised \$1100. more on budgets than the previous year and that student applications for the Fall are far beyond the usual number at this time and beyond last year's Fall enrollment. Amidst a spirit of rejoicing, Mr. Fernley announced that the two United Churches of Yarmouth had authorized a committee to purchase the former Bethany property in Yarmouth at a price of \$25,000. Another answered prayer in a series of answered prayers. Mr. Fernley stated that Saturday, September 18, is the tentative date for the opening of the new school in Sussex.

A report can not do justice to the substance and spirit of this year's Bethany service. We wish that all of our readers could have been present to have shared with us in the blessing we experienced.
