REPORTS FROM THE SOCIETIES

We are pleased to bring a report of fall activities from a number of our Young People's Societies. We have reports from Wood's Harbour, Truro, Millstream, Sussex, Marysville, Barker's Point, Millville, and Fort Fairfield.

Wood's Harbour reports that they have an active group of 25-30 young people under the leadership of their president, Ivan Cameron. Many of the young people take part in the new church choir.

During the past two years this society has grown greatly. This group printed invitations and conducted a visitation program during special meetings held in September.

TRURO has been conducting a study of a series of scriptural passages and then playing Bible Baseball to test how well the lessons have been learned.

Their society president is Roy Corey and their are about 20-25 young people attending the services.

MILLSTREAM has made use of the Bethany Correspondence Courses as a means of studying the Bible and have enjoyed the programs very much. They journeyed to Fredericton to see the Billy Graham film, "The Restless Ones". Pearley Hayes is the president of the society. The membership of sixteen is quite good for this church, and the young people are encouraged by the good attendance.

SUSSEX Y. P. is led by Allan Mitchell, a first year Bible Student. The society has had a musical program, a question and answer night, and a Halloween social at the Bible School, among other programs.

Attendance has ranged from 25-40.

MARYSVILLE has a society of 25-35 active members. They are led by Doug MacCallum and Roberta Nevers.

Programs have included a Remembrance Day service, an old timers program (only bald and grey-haired people could take part),

MILLVILLE is led by Mrs. Marcus Mc-Guigan. Their society has visited the Fredericton church when it was in special meetings and has visited the Woodstock church at various times.

The helpful suggestions of the pastor and his wife and the generous way in which the parsonage has been opened to the young people for socials has been appreciated.

FORT FAIRFIELD organized for the year on Sept. 16, 1965. Brenda Jewell was elected president for the year.

A Hallowe'en social was held at the home of Rev. A. L. Stairs. In an attempt to attract more young people to the service the type of program held each week is varied.

BARKER'S POINT have used a variety of programs. Speakers, films, carol sings, have highlighted programs in the past.

The society has divided into two parts for competitive co-operation. By working against each other in groups they work together to build a stronger, more active society.

Last year the society had a project and raised \$45.00 to buy a bicycle for the mission field.
