We need to see that there is a difference between sanctification and crankti-fi-cation. Sad to say, we have had an awful lot of foolishness that has gone under the guise of holiness.

Another reason for disinterest in holiness is the fact that there have been some people who made high professions but have not lived up to what they professed. I must say that I have seen enough inconsistency among some professing holiness people that, were it not for my faith in God and my loyalty to the Word of God, I would be an infidel. There have been some people who jumped high and shouted loud, but they did not walk straight when they hit the ground.

Now after saying this, I might say that there is another deep, underlying reason for people to reject this great truth, and that is this: the human heart rebels at the idea of the crucifixion of the old man. People don't like to die out to self and let God have His way. They are willing to sing, "Have thine own way," but deep down in their heart they are not willing to let God have His way. They want their own way.

We must recognize that some people are not trying to see how much religion they can get. They are trying to see how little they can get by on. They are not trying to see how Christlike they can become, but they are trying to see how much like the world they can live, and still squeeze by and make it to heaven. Such people do not like to think about being holy. They don't long to be perfectly whole. They want to have their own way.

However, there are some people who long for a pure heart. They want to be at their best for God. They have a great passion to know Christ in all His fulness. They feel like the Psalmist when he said, "As the hart panteth after the water-brook, so panteth my soul after thee, O God." To such people holiness is the most beautiful thing in all the world.

Blessed are they that do hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled. Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God. Without holiness no man shall see the Lord.

And without holiness no man will want to see God. Sin makes us want to run and hide from God. It is only as we are right with God that we can enjoy His fellowship. No sin can enter heaven. We must get rid of sin somewhere if we expect to spend eternity with Christ and the redeemed.

PHYSICAL HEALING OFTEN FOLLOWS SPIRITUAL HEALING

The following testimony, written by Lela M. Trout, of Yuma, Arizona, appeared in the January, 1965, issue of "Guideposts":

"Those who suffer physical or mental pain may be helped by an experience I had one day not long ago. At the time, I was in great pain from my arthritis. While driving to town, my concern shifted to another person with whom I was having a problem.

"Suddenly I found myself praying," Dear God, I have done so many things of which I am ashamed. Forgive me for the mistakes I have made with R————. Please keep her in Your care always."

"As soon as I had uttered the words, 'I've done things of which I am ashamed,' and in my thoughts yielded up to God the specific actions that weighed me down, the pain in my head and neck stopped. I was surprised but thought little of it until the pain did not return, and the painless days stretched into weeks and then into months Since that day . . . I have been free from pain."

HOW TO STAY HEALTHY, HAPPY

Dr. Walter W. Daniel, a physician of Atlanta, Georgia, once stated that backaches, headaches, heart conditions, and various aches and pains often are due to worry and unhappiness, that emotional disturbances can cause death.

The eminent physician explained: "When the emotions are aroused, more adrenalin is poured into the blood stream, producing high blood pressure — and occasionally death. There is the case of Sir John Hunter, a brilliant English physician who had a heart condition, and had predicted that some day he would lose his temper and die. The doctor got into a violent argument at a medical meeting one day, and dropped dead."

Dr. Daniel advised that people should adopt a mental attitude which would help them stay healthy. "Mental attitudes," he declared, "can delay recovery as well as produce illness. Stay happy and increase your chances of staying healthy." He set forth these rules for good health:

- 1. Learn to enjoy your work.
- 2. Have an objective.
- 3. Have a hobby.
- 4. Learn to like people.
- 5. Learn to be satisfied with your lot.
