Oh, but you are interested! We thought you would be. Surely this is a part of a wholesome Christian concern. This then is our message:

Our Alliance has appointed a committee to investigate the possibility of our denomination establishing and operating a home for the aged. The prime objective would be to provide accommodations that would offer physical comfort and care in an environment of Christian fellowship.

Such a home would be located in desireable surroundings, would be staffed by dedicated people, and would be operated on a non-profit financial basis designed to allow admittance and residence at rates that would be as reasonable as possible.

Personal expressions of interest in this proposed project would be helpful at this point. The reaction of many may be, "I think it would be wonderful for our denomination to operate such a home. What a fine thing it would be if the senior people of our churches could have such accommodations available". Others might be especially interested in contributing to the establishment of such a home, by cash donations, by bequest, or by leaving property to the Alliance for this purpose. Still others might be interested in serving on the staff of such a home. A supervisor, caretaker, cook, nurses, etc. would be needed.

10 REASONS FOR HAVING THE FAMILY ALTAR

- 1. Because as a service of worship, it will sweeten home life and enrich home relationship. There is no shrine more sacred than the place where families hold communion with the Heavenly Father.
- Because the family, as a divine institution, is the fundamental unit of society. It should therefore introduce into its life practices all that will strengthen and maintain the family integrity and family consciousness. Family worship should be a regular feature of every home.
- Because in this exercise you may lift into consciousness the portrait of Christ Jesus, thus to envisage Him as an example for daily living.
- 4. Because it will make you conscious throughout the day of the attending presence of the unseen, divine One, who will give you strength to perform your tasks and make you truer to every duty.
- 5. Because it will give you strength to meet discouragements and disappointments and fortify you against unexpected adversaries.
