A new vestry will be at the side instead of the present front entrance.

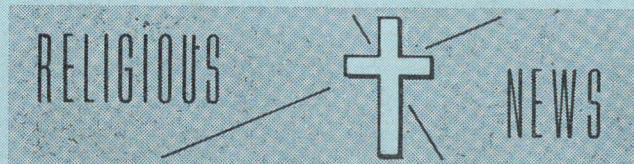

Pakistani Upholds Rights Of Missionaries

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan (EP)—Pakistan's parliamentary secretary said here that his government has no intentions of banning the activity of Christian missionaries in this predominantly Moslem country.

"Such a step would be a violation of fundamental religious rights guaranteed in Pakistan's constitution," declared Hamid Rheza Gilani in answer to queries raised in Parliament by non-Christian deputies.

He asserted that "there is freedom to practice and disseminate" religion in the country, and that "it makes no difference which religion is extended to foreigners, as well as to citizens."

The deputies' questions sprang from a recent agitation by some non-Christian leaders in the country who have been urging a ban against Christian missionaries.

Pakistan's total population of about 100 million, includes some 733,000 Christians. Moslems make up 88 percent of the people, and Hindus, 11 percent.
