

The Invocation was given by Rev. H. R. Ingersoll, superintendent, Reformed Baptist Church; salutatory, Lona Pearl Johnston; valedictory, Bonnie Churchill; with a vocal selection by Sylvia Marie Fuller and a choir selection by the college choir.

In giving the official farewell of Bethany to Yarmouth, President Stairs said that the college was moving to Sussex, N. B. in the best interests of the school. He said that certain advantages would be gained in the re-location of the school by its being more centrally located in the constituency which it serves. Students are from many parts of New Brunswick and Northern Maine, as well as Nova Scotia.

Mr. Stairs said that he wanted to make it unmistakably clear their going was not in any way to be interpreted as a lack of appreciation of the people of Yarmouth and of Western Nova Scotia. He said that no better friends or cordial associations could be hoped for elsewhere.

He made special mention of the churches and clergy of the area with whom the college had been associated in fellowship and ministry throughout the years, and also the businesses, organizations and public schools who had extended many kindnesses, as well as countless friends who had made life in the community most pleasant.

## MISSIONS

### HOME MISSION CHALLENGES

For some time I've been wanting to speak to our people through the medium of our Highway, concerning the Challenges of Home Mission work.

1. The greatest is that of proclaiming the message of Salvation and Heart Holiness. Since coming to Digby it has been a thrilling experience to deal with people, many for the first time, who are concerned about their spiritual needs. I've found that there is always a group who wants the message of Holiness. This is (our message) lets continue to move into new places with the message that meets the need of the human heart.

2. Secondly there is the challenge of building the work by the help of God.

God has been good and we can say with the hymn writer, "To God Be the Glory GREAT Things He Hath Done," here at Digby.

In our Annual Business meeting our people moved to support their pastor thus relieving the Home Mission Board. Here again we are reminded of God's goodness and we thank him for His Guidance.

3. "Thirdly there is the challenge of ERECTING THE HOUSE OF WORSHIP.

At the present time we have only a Basement Church. On Easter Sunday we launched a building fund and we realized receipts better than \$500. Since then the men of our church have cut nearly all the lumber that will be needed for our auditorium and an interested party has agreed to pay for the material that will be used on the outside.

We are trusting the Lord to continue to lay it upon the hearts of our people to, "Maintain the Cause". Plans are progressing favourably and we hope to be financially situated in the near future so that we can erect the main Auditorium. If God would have you to help, it will be greatly appreciated.

Please remember our work here and pray that we'll always accept the challenge before us.
