Another Easter offering has recorded our heart interest in missions abroad, leaving in its wake a satisfaction that our responsibility has been discharged for the time being at least. Jesus said, "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields," which surely takes us beyond our own borders, and challenges us to a world wide vision and involvement. Will Christ be satisfied, will the claims of Calvary be justified if our praying and giving is bottled up in Rhodesia and South Africa? It is disturbing to realize that we do not have a missionary representative in any other area of the world's needy millions. Another pertinent question that might be presented is this. How many of us are praying and giving to other missions dedicated to a task that we as a group are not prepared and equipped to undertake? As an example of what I mean, let me draw your attention to three worthy missions doing a work that is urgent yet singular in their field. World Vision with its compassion for the orphans and lepers of the Orient. Its conference program for the native pastors that they may be instructed in the Word of the Lord. Have you had a share in this? The World Literature Crusade, dedicated to placing a portion of gospel literature in every home. Hear this for instance, 993,974 homes reached in Peru, 581 decisions for Christ. In Japan 42,000,000 tracts distributed, 71,000 decisions for Christ. In I month 7,034 decisions for Christ in Korea. In India 1,700,000 pieces distributed, 1,275 decisions for Christ of which 50% were Hindu. So far reaching has this crusade been in India that the life of the missionaries have been threatened by revengeful Hindus. The next goal is Europe with a

special attack on Russia. Have you had a share in this? The Wycliff Bible Translators, whose main task is to provide primitive tribes with the Scriptures in their own language, and who encounter manifold dangers to achieve their objective. Would you like to share in the salvation of a Japanese, Korean, Hindu or Russian? Lift up your eyes, look on the fields, and act, by giving prayer and financial support to those who carry the glad tidings to other people of the earth.
