## NEWS ITEM

We have recently heard news concerning liquor legislation in the State of Maine. The Maine State Legislature has passed legislation allowing the sale of liquor on Sundays in the State liquor stores. However, the Maine Christian Civic League under the leadership of Rev. Benjamin C. Bubar, Jr. has spearheaded the circulation of a petition asking for a state wide referendum on the issue. A sufficient number of signers have been found (we believe 150,000) and a referendum will be held sometime soon.

The Highway wishes to commend Mr. Bubar's action in this important matter. We urge our Maine readers to support the activities of the civic League, and to work for an overwhelming "No" vote in the coming referendum.
