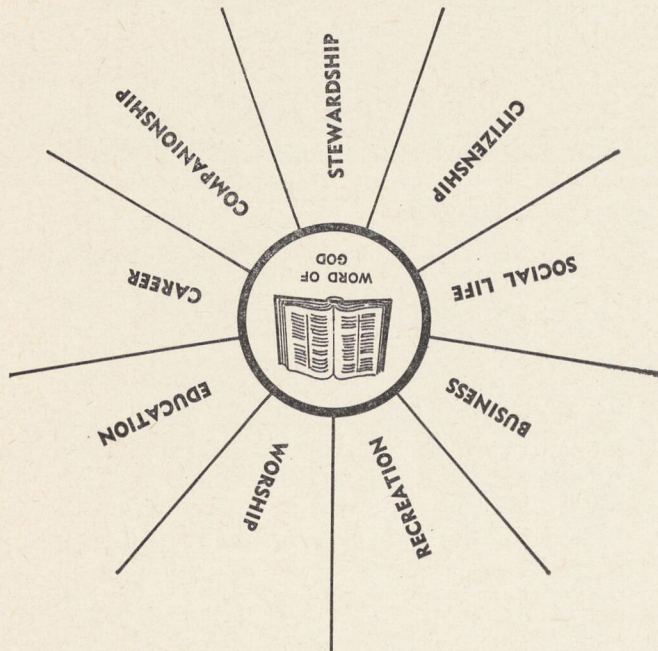

## WHAT BETHANY MEANS TO ME

I feel that I was led in the right direction when I made Bethany my choice of Bible Schools, for it was there that I learned much and grew in my Christian experience. I shall attempt to tell a small portion of what Bethany means to me.

The privilege of Christian fellowship I shall never forget. As students we had some wonderful times together—in song, prayer, sporting activities, or just in the discussion of various topics.

The spiritual life at Bethany was almost undescrivable. God's presence could be felt from rising time until bedtime; devotions, prayer meetings, and chapel services all contributed to the spiritual atmosphere. Something that was a special help and blessing to me was the opening of our classes with a hymn, a prayer or both. This seemed to draw our class closer together and to the Lord. Often our classes were so enjoyable some of us would later remark, "I got so happy I felt like shouting." Through the study of the various religious and Biblical subjects I gained much useful knowledge. Through such study I began to realize how little I had known before and how much there was to learn.

At Bethany I found a very dedicated staff of workers, any one of whom always found time to listen to one's problems, reason things out together, and offer wise words of advice. I believe I profited as much in this respect as I did from book knowledge. I am very grateful for the interest and help of the staff.

I must mention the discipline of the school which I now appreciate much more than I did while at the school. There were certain rules in which I could see no value and I questioned them. I now see the wisdom behind them and I'm glad I couldn't always have my own way. I feel this discipline has been a help to me.

I would highly recommend that young people take one year or more at B.B.C. — a little school with much to offer. I thank God for it and pray His blessings upon it.

### Missionary Rally

Mission Day at Beulah Camp was climaxed by the Foreign Missionary Rally. Music was under the direction of Paul Mullen. Special speakers were Rev. and Mrs. Paul Sanders of Ermelo, South Africa, missionaries on furlough; also Miss Ruth Symonds, R.N., assistant director of nursing services at Victoria Public Hospital, Fredericton and Miss Roberta Nevers, R.N., head nurse of the surgical ward in the same hospital. Miss Symonds and Miss Nevers are nurses under appointment for a temporary term of service in Bethesda Mission Hospital, Rhodesia. Rev. H. R. Ingersoll offered the prayer of dedication for the outgoing Christian nurses.

### Missionary Itinerary

Rev. and Mrs. Charles Sanders have prepared their itinerary for visiting our churches. Every pastor is encouraged to co-operate with our missionaries in making the itinerary as helpful and practical as possible. This can be achieved by accepting the dates given for each area. This will save time and unnecessary travel. Our missionaries are equipped with slides, projector and screen.

### Missionary Giving

Our missionary giving last year broke all records. This indicates dedication and involvement. Our budgets are set this year for a minimum of \$50,000.00 This means in round numbers \$1000.00 weekly to foreign missions or \$140.00 per day.

### World Missions

We believe that all departments of the Lord's work will benefit from our union with the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America. This is true of foreign missions.

In Wesleyan World Missions 112 consecrated missionaries serve capably and energetically in 13 foreign countries on every continent except Europe. Including associates, overseas membership totals 10,030. On most of the Wesleyan fields churches have been organized into annual conferences; more and more they are becoming self-supporting.

We believe there will be many important advantages from our union. Dedicated to the message of holiness of heart and life, the Wesleyan Mission purposes to foster the growth of a Spirit filled international church. Let us pray that the missionary outreach of our church be greatly accelerated.
