A record number of children and teenagers attended Daily Vacation Bible School at Beulah Camp this year. The director of the school was Miss Lenette Woodworth of our Fredericton Church, and the supervisor was Mrs. Ruth Black, director of our children's work.

The Children's Tabernacle saw a larger than capacity group of children from Monday to Saturday, making it necessary for about 50 children to meet with their teachers for opening exercises, rather than with the rest of the boys and girls. On Friday 123 children registered, and on Saturday morning, 169 children were present. On Monday 203 were in attendance, and the number increased each day until a total of 240 were present the final day.

On Friday morning, Rev. Lawrence Mullen spoke to the boys and girls and asked all those who had accepted Christ as their personal Savior to join him at the front. Fifteen children and teenagers followed this larger group to accept Christ into their own hearts. The spirit of the living God filled the tabernacle as these children found Christ as their personal Savior.

On Saturday afternoon, the closing program was held in the main tabernacle with a capacity group in attendance. Skits, songs, choruses, and memory versus helped to evidence what the children had learned. During the program, Mrs. Black announced that over two miles of pennies had been raised by the children during the last four years.

Following the program, the Christmas tree was moved to the center of the platform, and the Christmas tree candles were lighted as the children and adults, joined in singing Christmas carols for the "Christmas in July" project. The children put several hundred gifts under and around the tree. We thank the churches and the children of our denomination for the several hundred gifts that will now be sent to the missionaries to give to the African boys and girls.
