

CONSIDERING COLLEGE? BEGIN AT BETHANY

- Special Message to our Y. P. -

Maybe you have thought that Bethany did not fit into your college plans. But there are a couple of things that you should consider before you take the big step.

You should know what education is: its ultimate aim and its means of attaining that end. In other words, you should know what you are "going after." "Twenty-three hundred years ago Plato said in his 'Republic' that the ultimate aim of education is the training of character; a few years ago Sir Richard Livingstone, then Vice-Chancellor of Oxford, said the same thing at the University of Toronto." (From "Graduating From Life") In short, education should do something for the person, himself.

If education, then, has to do with personal development, especially in the Christian sense, I venture to say that Bethany is making a greater contribution to education than many colleges and universities. This is why we say, "Begin at Bethany."

Admittedly, Bethany can not train you to be a teacher, a nurse, a lawyer, an engineer. You will need to go to university to gain certain specialized knowledge. But be willing to accept the fact that even modern university training often has its limitations and weaknesses. It may give you career training without character training. A year at a school like Bethany may fill the void in your educational program.

How tragic that a materialistic concept pervades today's educational world. For your own sake and for Jesus' sake, do not merely make a vocation and a high-level salary your educational aims. Do not bow to the popular campus god of materialism.

We can say "Begin at Bethany" for another reason. A year or two at Bethany can be a door to further college training. In recent years Bethany students have been transferred successfully to Eastern Nazarene College, Marion College, Olivet Nazarene College, God's Bible College, and Winona Lake School of Theology. In all cases substantial credit was given for Bethany work toward the earning of degrees.

RESOLUTIONS

We, the New Brunswick Woman's Christian Temperance Union assembled at the 58th Annual Convention being held in Moncton on May 30, 31 and June 1, 1966, do hereby pledge our love and loyalty to our Queen and express our gratitude for Her devotion to duty throughout the Empire.

We present the following resolutions:—

1. Realizing our need of Divine help we urge our members to heed the admonition of the Apostle Paul to pray without ceasing regarding our work, remembering especially our noon-tide prayer.

2. Resolved that we urge all union members and those affiliated with churches to be prompt in voicing their protest against the opening of taverns, cocktail lounges, etc., in their respective areas. We regret that the hours have been lengthened for the sale of intoxicating beverages thus making it more convenient to obtain the same.

3. Resolved that we urge our Government to continue the prohibition of advertising which would promote the sale of alcoholic beverages.

4. Resolved that we take strong action against the sale of lottery tickets in the schools by students, and that all gambling be prohibited.

5. Resolved that we commend the CBC and privately owned stations for co-operation with the W.C.T.U. on radio and television, also for many fine programs. We would ask that there be more Christian programs on Sunday and would strongly urge the banning of all scenes which depict drinking and violence and use of profanity.

6. Resolved we urge that the W.C.T.U. continue to work with the Department of Alcohol Education in the distribution of Temperance literature in schools and colleges

7. Whereas there is a general increase in the establishment of liquor outlets and the consumption of alcoholic beverages, be it resolved that we go on record as opposing such increase, and that we urge our people to uphold the Covenants of our Churches in the act of total abstinence; that our churches observe at least one Sunday annually as Temperance Sunday with a strong Temperance message.

8. Be it resolved that we go on record as opposing any act of legislation that will intefere with the observance of the Lord's Day. Be it also resolved that our people be encouraged to faithfully observe the

Lord's Day.

9. Resolved that we emphasize very strongly the fact that we believe in total abstinence and our standards must not be lowered, and our co-operation with the N. B. Temperance Federation be continued.

10. Resolved that a protest be made to authorities regarding the matter of liquor consumption on trains, boats and planes, and that we strongly protest the undesirable conditions that prevail on these modes of transportation due to the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages.

11. Resolved that we ask Transit Companies to enforce their rules against smoking on buses.
