Another first. It was a pleasure to attend the first Youth Camp seminar for counsellors and directors ever held in the Reformed Baptist Church.

At 10 o'clock or shortly after, a group of about 35 young people gathered at Bethany Bible College, Sussex, N. B. to begin a very full day of study and discussion about the

operation of a Youth Camp.

The seminar was organized by Bert Crozier, an employee of N.B. Tel, in co-operation with Doug MacCallum. Speakers at the seminar were Rev. N. E. Trafton, who spoke on the role of the evangelist at Youth Camp; Ross MacCallum, who spoke on the importance of safety in a camp; Miss Roberta Nevers, who spoke on health problems; Bert Crozier, who spoke to the group about the duties of a director and the duties of a counsellor emphasizing the need for teamwork.

A demonstration of the proper technique in conducting campfires was very interesting and amusing. The panel discussion about camp discipline problems clearly demonstrated that discipline is more of an individual matter of camper and counsellor than a set of rules that could be laid down and followed, although helpful guidelines were suggested.

A buffet luncheon was served at the

close of the day.

Persons attending the seminar came from Saint John, Moncton, Marysville and Fort Fairfield. It is hoped that persons from other areas will attend the seminar next year as well as those who attended this year.

Expressing the feeling of all who attended, I wish to thank Bert Crozier for the excellent job of organization and co-ordination which made the seminar run smoothly

and efficiently.

A MIRACLE

There are those who flatly state that the age of miracles is in the past. Often their arguments are almost convincing. However, many times we are not informed when "modern miracles" do happen.

For many years the children's meetings at Beulah Camp used the Jones Cottage, the Hotel verandah and other convenient spots. Then these facilities became inadequate. Mrs. Ruth Black, the Children's Director, asked Rev. Jack Stevens to investigate the possibilities of a new building for the children's work. The minister felt prompted by the Holy Spirit to promise a building for the next year. At the Daily Vacation Bible School closing, it was announced that a Children's Tabernacle would be dedicated the following year.

There was no money for this fund. Neither were there any building materials. But the Lord provided. The children collected eight hundred dollars. Sunday School offerings for this project added another seven hundred dollars. And the miracle

was only beginning.

An abandoned church whose dimensions were thirty-one feet by fifty-one feet was available at Westfield for one thousand dollars. After a series of follow-ups, the building was purchased for a mere ten dollars. Then another mountain emerged. The building had to be moved to the campground. To complicate matters, there were no engineers to supervise the work. With knowledge gleaned from self-training and experience, a few members of the Norton church plus a handful of volunteers cut the

From another company, three hundred dollars worth of roofing was purchased. Again when an attempt to pay the bill was made, the manager told the committee to worry about putting on the roofing and he would worry about paying the bill. As a result, the majority of the fifteen hundred dollars was used for the cost of building transportation and the replacement of decayed boards. The windows were refinished, the building was painted inside and out, an at the time of dedication in the following year, the treasury contained approximately two hundred dollars.

This year, another three hundred dollars has been spent in providing additional classroom space. No one can deny the importance of the children's work. Its members will constitute our church of tomorrow. Further investment is necessary if we are to keep pace with the growing demands of this work. God saw fit to make us a miracle. Let us share in its blessing by participating in the offerings held on June the fifth in our churches.

There were a number of gems from the sermons and talks given by Rev. Lovin that we will remember for a long time. Friday night we were reminded that when Christ seeks out youth He is after a life, not only a soul. Saturday morning we were given the Teen Commandments; Have a definite time to pray. Be a consistent Bible reader. Memorize at least a verse a day. God has a standard for every personality. Have Christian convictions in courtship. Live a life of vision and burden to witness. Be courageous. Resist temptation. Overcome despondency. Maintain your confidence. Sunday morning we were given a lesson in logic on Holiness. (1) Man is born in sin. (2) There can be no sin in Heaven. Therefore it is self-evident that (3) somewhere in life the sin question must be dealt with. Sunday afternoon we learned what a cafeteria Christian is—one who displays what Jesus Christ can do for the soul and life in such an appealing way that people looking on will want to serve the Lord. We can be vessels of honour to the Lord. Then the climax was reached Sunday night when a number of young people, among them married couples, sought the Lord for spiritual help and for salvation.

Pray for those that received help at the Rally. We don't want the Devil to defeat those who have so recently been won to the Lord or have gone farther up the road.
