The new church project was started about a year ago and at this time is all paid by generous members of the congregation and friends except a loan of \$1230. The pews have also been paid for. Three special offerings had been taken during the year amounting to five hundred dollars, one thousand dollars and \$1556 respectively. Missionary givings were also attended to and the parsonage was renovated. Much praise was given to the minister, Mr. Ricker who besides organization had put in many hours of manual labor along with the members of the congregation.

For a number of months before the completion of the church, services had been held in the basement. The new auditorium is beautifully finished with light walnut, the furniture is of red oak and attractive lighting fixtures add to the church's love-

liness.
