Mr. Whittey came to class with a knife and said, "There's been a murder in the Camp." Everyone listened. He had killed a branch. Attention getting devices like that had the boys interested and wondering what was coming next.

There were a number of Campers saved Sunday night and on Decision Night. Some of these Campers expressed a desire to be baptized and when questioned and given an opportunity to ask questions showed an insight into Christianity equal to those who have been Christians for a number of years.

Except for Decision Night, Wednesday, the boys had a campfire on the beach each night. Then on Saturday morning the Camp closed with a giant water fight on the baseball field and a boat ride on the river for each of the Campers who wished to go.

**RIVERSIDE YOUTH CAMP** Reports from Riverside show that our largest Camp was held there with over seventy in attendance. Rev. and Mrs. Hazen Ricker directed the

Camp and Rev. Sheila Graham was the evangelist and teacher.

Riverside is our only Camp where a Youth and Adult Camp are operated at the same time. This gave the Youth Campers an extra opportunity to display musical talent which was used in the evening services. A Camp Choir was formed by the whole Youth Camp and a number of the Campers sang special numbers in song and played musical instruments. It was also reported that a number of the Campers were saved and helped spiritually. The Camp was enjoyed by the Campers very much.

**CAMP PENIEL** Camp Peniel was held on the United Baptist Church Camp Grounds at Cedar Lake, Digby Co. N. S. The Camp was directed by Rev. Karl Gorman and Rev. Marven Durling was the Camp evangelist and teacher. This Camp far exceeded the expectations of the workers and the grounds proved to be too small for the fifty-four Campers who attended.

Swimming facilities were used frequently at Cedar Lake as a busy program of Bible

Classes, sports and church services was followed. It was reported that about twelve to fourteen young people were saved, many of them for the first time. Five of the new converts were from the Digby church.

The Camp ran from Thursday to Thursday. On the final Thursday the Yarmouth and Port Maitland churches came and held their annual picnic. A good time was enjoyed by all.

Altogether, about 275 people attended Camp this summer and about 50 young people received definite help from the Lord. Praise be to the name of the Lord!

I am sure that I speak for each Camp Director when I say that the co-operation of the Campers and the willingness and hard work of each counsellor and worker was deeply appreciated.

We are happy to have the privilege of communicating our thoughts through the Highway to our people before leaving for Rhodesia.

We are going in response to our urgent request for nurses in our Rhodesian hospital, which was relayed to us through our Foreign Mission Board early in May. We were asked to consider a years appointment.

We are going also in response in God's leading in each of our lives. Some four years ago Roberta felt a call for Foreign Mission Service, but until the contact from the Board had not felt lead to make any definite move. Ruth has felt a definite leading to give some full time service to missions since her automobile accident in May of 1965.

We are scheduled to leave the Fredericton airport at 5 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 19th and fly via jet from Halifax to London. With a four day stop over in London and a two day one in Salisbury, we will be arriving in Wankie (forty miles from our hospital) on Monday, Sept. 26th.

We are eagerly anticipating our period of service in the Lord's work in this field, and trust we can give assistance and support as needed.

We wish to thank each one who gave us encouragement, and evidenced such enthusiastic interest in this undertaking, particularly at the Beulah and Riverside Foreign Missionary Services.

The sudden death of Rev. Stafford Hutchinson occurred in the Moncton City Hospital, from a heart seizure, on July 28th, 1966; at the age of 57.

The funeral service was held from the United Baptist Church, Havelock, N. B.; conducted by Rev. G. A. Inman, pastor of the Killam's Mills, and Salem Reformed Baptist churches. The scripture was read by Rev. Harold Arboo of Albert, and prayer was offered by Rev. Scott Ingersoll of Calais. Rev. H. R. Ingersoll, Superintendent of the Reformed Baptist Alliance spoke in recognition of Bro. Hutchinson's brief ministry, and brought words of comfort to the family. Rev. S. E. Cameron of Saint John rendered a special number in song, "In Times Like These." Rev. R. G. Moorehouse of Sandford brought the message, speaking from the text, "And thou shalt be secure, because there is hope." Job 11:18a, stating that Mr. Hutchinson had spoken from the same verse of scripture, on one occasion, when he was a guest speaker in his church. Rev. B. D. Price of Lower Hainsville, pronounced the Benediction.

Interment was in the Fair Haven Memorial Gardens. Rev. E. W. Tokley read the scripture, and Rev. B. C. Cochrane offered prayer at the cemetery.
