Over the years the Youth Rally has continued to grow and grow; not only in size, but also in the variety and depth of program planning, prayer emphasis and promotional preparation.

It was not too many years ago that the Woodstock Church was packed out as we were blessed by the inspired preaching of Dr. O. G. Wilson. Then the Rally moved to Marysville and the School auditorium because none of our churches were large enough to hold the crowd that was attending. Five to seven hundred people filled the auditorium for three rallies to hear Rev. Everest and Rev. Bray.

There was the night that the convicting power of the Holy Spirit moved in as Merle Smith made a broken appeal for young people to seek the Lord and more than a score moved forward. That was a heavenly experience.

Then we moved again; to Moncton and the Brunswick Hotel. As many as twenty people had been entertained in some homes in the Fredericton area. Now with half of the young people in the Hotel the Rally has become something like a Convention. If you got in to the Hotel you ate meals, slept, and worshipped under the same roof. There was the fun of waiting for an elevator, the fellowship in the lobby and at the coffee shop and the joy of being awakened by the trains at five o'clock in the morning. More than seven hundred

people attended the services Sunday.

There is a thrill and an excitement here that teenagers can really go for. It moves and goes and doesn't leave you with an empty feeling after it is all over. It is alive and in step with the younger generation. At the same time the old truths of Holiness, Salvation, Sin, Heaven and Hell are presented very clearly and very plainly.

There is an attraction at the Youth Rally that exists only in some of our churches. It is the attraction of the crowd. A young, impressionable, unsaved youth seeking the real meaning of life can see hundreds of happy, dedicated youth enjoying the service of the Lord.

When you see as many seekers at a weekend series of services as you do quite often at Beulah Camp, you can't help being one hundred per cent behind the Youth Rally.
