Each year our children have a missionary project. During the past year a croupette was purchased for Bethesda Hospital. We are waiting for confirmation from Africa that one has been installed at the hospital.

In previous years we have sent money to Betnesda Hospital to purchase an incubator, and our first project was to help secure funds to build the ROSAMOND DOW MEMORIAL CHURCH in Rhodesia.

Three years ago a program was initiated-"mile of pennies for Jesus". The response from all our people was tremendous and in two years we had the "mile of pennies" (\$800).

When the program was launched, our children were promised that the pennies would be used in some project that would be an asset in reaching African children for God. In talking with Rev. Glendon Kierstad, I found his vision and mine were quite similar. Reading material in the hands of native boys and girls seemed most important - tracts, small books, short stor-

ies, reproduction of scriptures, etc.
Upon consultation with the Mission Board, it was agreed that an Electronic Scanner and a Gestetner should be pur-

This is one of the greatest needs of Africa today. Children are learning to read and will read whatever is made available to them. Communists have recognized this great reading need and are sending their Godless literature to Africa in great quantities, we are told. It is essential that every one of our boys and girls have religious reading material, especially stories and tracts.

Each church is asked to elect a "mile of pennies" treasurer, and initiate some local promotional program to let children in your local churches know the importance of saving pennies to purchase the above mentioned materials.
