bers from the wrong perspective. How often people say in reference to inactive mem-bers, "They took a vow," "They understand their obligations," "They are of age," "They know what they ought to do," "If they don't do it, let's exercise disciplinary action."

The truth of the matter is, every inactive member of a Church has committed, or is in the process of committing, spiritual suicide. The Light has gone out—alas, the darkness of blinded eyes! The Love has waned-how tragic is the emptiness of a Love-less soul! The Life is expiring-once again it is becoming a "body of death."

The problem of inactive members is not primarily that of law and discipline, but it is one of love and evangelism. God is giving us the opportunity of participating in a spiritual renewal that will make possible the inactive becoming active again.

Moreover, I would suggest that God is giving us an opportunity for THE ACTIVE TO BECOME MORE ACTIVE. Let's face honestly an extremely personal question: how many of us are as active for Jesus Christ and His Church as we should be and could be?

Let me mention hurriedly three areas in which the active Christian should become more active. First of all, there is the realm of Christian Stewardship. Do we really believe that all that we are, all that we have, all that we are capable of becoming or having, are a trust from God? Do we use what we are and what we have for the glory of God, for the service of our fellow-men, for the edification of ourselves? Do we really live as those who are conscious that some day we will give an accounting to the Master for what we did with what we are and what we have?

The second area is that of Churchmanship. We need the Church. Also, the Church needs us. Are we permitting the Church to utilize our abilities, our talents, our time, our treasure?

The other area is that of Witnessing. Are we active witnesses for Christ? Are you witnessing daily concerning the Saviour to those on the outside?

Let's be honest. Even though we are active, should we not become more active? And remember, God is giving us an opportunity for such intensified spiritual activity. III.

Likewise, God is giving us an opportunity for THE MORE ACTIVE TO BE MORE THAN ACTIVE. As we have already noted, increased activity that is consecrated is absolutely essential for the progress of the Christian Church. But this increased activity cannot be consecrated and effective unless it is undergirded by a personal spiritual devotion and Christian discipline. A healthy form of quietism is the real source of a radiant activism in the life of the Church.

What are some of the essential elements in a wholesome quietism? There should be the daily Quiet Time—the period for introspection, meditation, Bible study, devotional reading, prayer. There should be the Holy Life—the discipline of soul and the concentration of mind that result in righteousness of character. And there should be the continuing Christian Influence — the daily Quiet Time and the constant Holy Life manifesting themselves in an influence which is pronounced upon all those being contacted in the various relationships of life.

Christ as He speaks to His disciples: "You have a saving, have you not, 'Four months yet, then harvest'?" (It was a saying of procrastination.) But Jesus continues: "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields: for they are white already to harvest."

Opportunities must be seized at once, for they pass so quickly. "Now is the acceptable time." An artist solicited permission to paint a portrait of Queen Victoria of England. The favor was granted. A place and time were arranged. At the fixed place and time the Queen was present, but the artist was late in arriving. When he did arrive the Queen had left, leaving a message that she would not return.

An interesting epigram survives a statue which once stood in a Greek city. It is in the form of a conversation between a traveler and the statue:

"What is thy name, O statue?"

"I am called Opportunity."

"Who made thee?"

"Lysippus."

"Why art thou on thy toes?"

"To show how quickly I pass by."

"But why is thy hair so long on thy forehead?"

"That men may seize me when they meet me.'

"Why, then, is thy head so bald behind?" "To show that, when I have once passed, I cannot be caught."

Now is the acceptable time to begin daily devotions. Now is the acceptable time to establish the family altar. Now is the acceptable time to be personally disciplined. Now is the acceptable time to practice Christian Stewardship. Now is the accep-table time to observe the spiritual law of tithing. Now is the acceptable time to begin the habit of regular attendance at the public worship services of the Church. Now is the acceptable time to volunteer to teach a Sunday School Class. Now is the acceptable time to begin witnessing to those about you.

Alas for those who fail to take advantage of spiritual opportunities! The writer of the Proverbs declares: "He that sleepeth in harvest is a son that causeth shame." Let this be paraphrased aptly: "He that sleepeth in the presence of spiritual opportunity is a professing Christian of whom God is ashamed.'

Up until the time it was accomplished, the climbing of Mt. Everest was constantly an intriguing hope. When George Leigh-Mallory, the one man who may have reached the top of this highest mountain in the world a quarter of a century ago, though we will never be sure, was asked the question, "Why do you want to climb Mt. Ever-est?" he replied, "Because it is there." "Unfinished adventures" always beckon

spiritually-minded and courageous individuals to their accomplishment. Today we think not of "unfinished adventures" in the realm of the material or of the physical universe, but of the challenges in the realm of spiritual experience and in the life and activity of the Church. Let us accept the spiritual challenges of the inactive becoming active, of the active becoming more active, of the more active becoming more than active—"because they are there." Let us dedicate ourselves to the Living God, and let us appropriate fully the Grace of Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, so that these inescapable challenges will be met and so that we will seize the opportunities that God is giving us.
