Next Sunday (16th) he will have service at Markhamville at 10.30 and at Watford at 3. The following Sunday (23rd) he will have service at Mechanic at 11 and at Watford at 7.30. Everybody welcome.

—Rev. Norman J. Thomas, a probationer of the United Church of Canada, has been engaged for one year to serve the Newtown circuit. Henderson, of London, England, president of the New Brunswick Gas and Oil Fields Co., Ltd., arrived in Moncton last Monday from the Old Country to inspect the work being done in the Albert County gas and oil fields in Lower Coverdale. He expects to remain for at least two months. Work on the gas fields has been proceeding for some time and the latest reports indicated that one well was down about 2800 feet, and another about 1700 feet. They do not expect to strike gas in any large quantity until the drillers have gone down about 3000 feet.

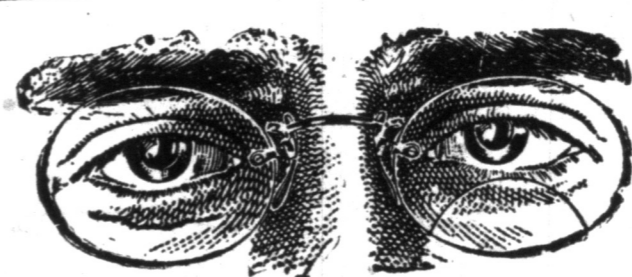
