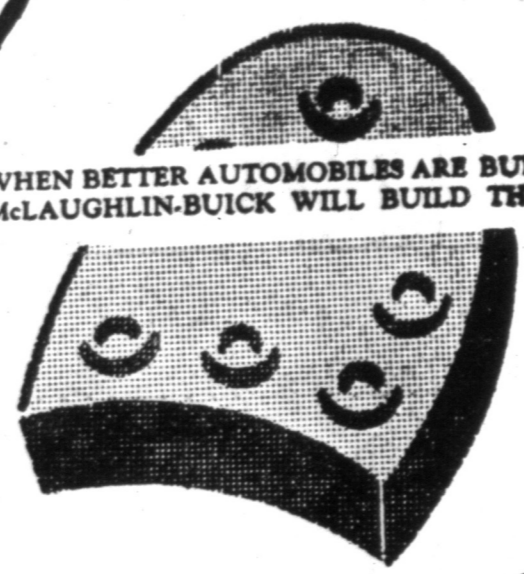

PREDICTS DRUGS TO ABOLISH SLEEP AND CREATE SUPER-MEN AS WELL

Philadelphia—The possibility that research in organic chemistry, now aimed at discovering dyestuffs, may lead to astonishing changes in human life, even elimination of the necessity for sleep and attainment of genius and reform of character by use of drugs, was expounded before the jubilee convention of the American Chemical Society by Irene du Pont,

former president of E. I. du Pont de Nemours and Co. "We know that some adults sleep more hours per night than others," said Mr. du Pont. "It seems likely that this is due to some slight differences either in the nature of accumulated poisons which necessitate sleep for their removal or a less rapid elimination of the poisons by those who sleep less efficiently. "Would it not seem likely that the reactions may be hastened by some catalytic agent or even that the antidote itself may be prepared and administered, thereby either decreasing the amount of sleep required or doing away with the necessity of sleep entirely?"

Such a discovery, he pointed out, would increase the time of production and leisure 50 per cent.

Taking up the matter of mental stimulants, Mr. du Pont suggested to the 4,000 delegates a prospect of synthetic supermen.

"Certain drugs tend to stupify and prevent humans from thinking clearly," he said. "Others drugs, such as caffeine, taken in tea and coffee, to some extent stimulate the mind. Is it not possible that there exist still other compounds which might stimulate the mind to a greater extent so that mentally all the users would become supermen or geniuses?"

Remarking that "it is proverbial that if one's liver is out of order it definitely affects one's outlook on life," he continued that "it does not seem unreasonable to suppose that one's character itself is the result of the sum total of certain chemical reactions in the body," and he added: "When the nature of this is understood, may we expect that by injecting proper compounds into an individual we may make his character to order?"
