

that it finds more advocates among them than among "foreigners." What would you think if we were to tell you that two gentlemen whom it is said will offer for the County, and one who comes forward for the City of St. John, and who are natives, were admirers of the Canada Rebellion, and have openly expressed themselves so! Our advice is, let us join to keep them out, and not be cavilling about what country they belong to.

We have much pleasure in publishing to-day Lord John Russell's despatch to the Right Honourable C. Poulett Thomson, late Governor General of British North America. This despatch is dated Oct. 14th 1839; only two days antecedent to the noble Lord's famous circular! We have perused both documents carefully, and cannot find any thing like the "Responsible Government" measure many are trying to torture out of it. The circular, instead of making the Executive Councilors responsible to the House of Assembly, makes them responsible to the Governor and to him alone, acting as Her Majesty's Representative. He says, "You will understand, and will cause it to be generally known, that hereafter the tenure of Colonial officers held during Her Majesty's pleasure, will not be regarded as equivalent to a tenure during good behaviour," and again he says, "that a change in the person of the Governor will be considered as a sufficient reason for any alterations which his successor may deem it expedient to make in the list of public functionaries, subject of course, to the future confirmation of the sovereign." This is all right enough; we are perfectly willing the Executive Council shall be responsible to the Queen's Representative; but to prove that Lord John Russell had no such intentions as some of our wise-acres would faintly hint at, we need only refer our readers to the despatch he wrote two days previous, and which we have copied in full; and we hereby call on the grumblers who allege that the measure they are bawling for is one which has been recommended by Her Majesty's Minister, to stand forth and show their authority! Their assertions will not do for us, for we are determined to let people see their fallacy.

CAUTION!!!

We think it necessary to caution our readers not to put any faith in the false assertions of those journals who are boring us with their crude ideas of "Responsible Government." The New Brunswick of this morning very coolly asserts that the Hon. Charles Simonds, and Isaac Woodward Esq., "have at all times, and on all occasions, boldly and independently advocated retrenchment and reform!" A more unblushing falsehood has never appeared in print.

It is well known that we have always advocated (so far as provincial affairs are concerned,) measures, not men. We have neither praised or denounced any individual; and there is not a journal in the Province more opposed to bad government than we are:—we deprecate the acts of the late House of Assembly, and have said, and will again say, that they have brought ruin and bankruptcy upon the Province. And with regard to the gentlemen on whom the New Brunswicker showers its praise, we can find no fault with their conduct during the last session of the House of Assembly; but what did they do for several years previous? Why no two men in the Assembly were more lavish, or seemingly more anxious to squander the public revenue than they. The Hon. Charles Simonds was one of the delegates who went to England to solicit the control of the Provincial Revenue being placed in the hands of the House of Assembly, thus taking an active part in the very measure which has been productive of such disastrous results, and saddling the Province for ever with 13,000 pounds a year for the civil list! And both he and Mr. Woodward strenuously supported all the extravagant grants, passed during Sir John Harvey's administration!! They voted for the thousands thrown away on the repairs of Government House, which is still but little better than an old barn; they voted for the thousand pounds provincial contingencies, and one of them knows what has become of it, though he "won't tell."—And they voted for fifteen hundred pounds sterling to be given Sir John, to purchase a new service of plate, that he might be enabled to sell his old plate to pay his debts!!! These are the immaculates the New Brunswicker would hold up as fitting subjects on whom to bestow our gratitude! Shame!! Shame!! While we are on this subject, we may

as well notice the insulting impudence of a "responsible" correspondent of the New-Brunswick, under the signature of *An Observer*; in his letter which appeared this morning, we find the following sentence:—"In England the House of Commons having Legislatively the initiation of all money grants, hold a power sufficiently energetic to accomplish any measures demanded by the exigencies of the state." The utter falsity of this assertion is proven by the well known fact that the *Ministry*, not the *House of Commons*, have "Legislatively" the initiation of all money grants; and "an observer" must either be an egregious blockhead, or a scoundrel:—a blockhead if he knew no better; a scoundrel if he did know better and attempted to gull his readers:—he may choose either horn of the dilemma that suits him best.
