

THE LOYALIST.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 13, 1842.

We recommend to the perusal of our readers, the copious extracts we have made in this day's paper, from the Canadian press. They are nearly unanimous in their denunciations of the late appointments made by Sir Charles Bagot; and no wonder. It is both humiliating and distressing to our feelings to know that the same temporizing policy which in ten years or less, produced a rebellion which cost four or five millions sterling to suppress, and at the same time much individual misery, suffering and death;—it is distressing to think that the same farce is about to be re-enacted.

It is impossible at the present moment to come to any conclusion, whether, Sir Charles Bagot has so far forgotten what is due to his character as a British Officer, as to lead himself to the views of the men who a short time since were denounced as rebels;—whether he considers himself bound to carry any measures to which the late Governor might have pledged himself—or whether he is acting in accordance with instructions received from her Majesty's Ministers;—though we sincerely hope it may not be the latter. But this we know, that his policy is both unwise and unjust. He has removed Mr. Ogden, an old and tried servant, and one of the most talented men in the Canada;—a man whose eloquence at the bar could scarcely be equalled by any orator of the present age;—he has removed him to make way for Mr. Lafontaine, a member of the Papineau faction, and an abettor of rebellion; and he has removed Mr. Davidson, another tried loyalist, to fill his place with Mr. Girouard, a rebel, and one for whom apprehension Sir John Colborne would not have hesitated to call Messrs. Hays and Harrison, two gentlemen not only disaffected, to seats in the Executive Council, and appointed Mr. Baldwin the office of Attorney General of Canada, an American born, and one who took an active part in the rebellion, and who, had he been taken the time, would in all probability, have ended his career on the gallows.

There is one thing we noticed particularly in the intent was Sir Charles in his calling those miscreants to the aid of the Government. And speaking of Mr. Davidson's return, he says, "being understood that this gentleman had been provided for in a manner suitable to his claims." But in Mr. Lafontaine's reply, he stipulates, among others, following condition on which he will accept office.

Secondly.—That the proposition to make provision for the retiring officers, Ogden and Mr. Davidson, is to be an open question." To which Sir Charles replied, "The Governor General concurs in those modifications."

But the best of the game is, that the old rebel, Girouard, had more sense than the Governor, and absolutely refused to accept office! But oh! what an humiliating picture does this present! The Governor General of British North America, after trampling on the Loyalists of Canada, those who had always been peaceable and well-disposed towards the British Government, who had suffered all the miseries of the cause—who had cheerfully shed their bloods in the hour of danger and contributed most essentially to the defeat of the rebel forces—after trampling on their rights, after taking their claims, and discharging them, whom he acknowledges has rendered the Government "long and faithful services," he offers a situation of honour and trust to a rebel and an outlaw—a man for whom blood-money had been offered, and after all finds the old Radicalists his proposals with disdain!
