SUPREME COURT.—Several civil cases have been disposed of during the week. It seems that when the building was on fire, the Plaintiffs desired the Defendant to suffer the property to be removed, which he refused; on these grounds the action was founded:—Verdict for the defendant.

In consequence of the indisposition of the Attorney General, the trial for arson, mentioned in our last, did not commence till to day; from the contradictory state of the evidence which we understand will be brought forward, we think it will be very difficult for the jury to come to any decision; excepting that the mill was burnt by some person.

This recklessness in swearing, argues a lamentable falling off in the morals of this community; we understand two men were committed for perjury themselves, in giving evidence on a case yesterday!!

The Lecture season of the Mechanics' Institute was opened at the Hall last evening. The Hon. William B. Kinnear, delivered an excellent Introductory Address, in the course of which he forcibly urged upon the young members of the Institute in particular, the necessity of deep thought and study in those branches of science and general knowledge which are useful, or worthy of the pursuit of rational beings, and alluded, in a clear manner, to the numerous advantages to be derived from such institutions by all who visit them with attentive and inquiring minds.
