

man in the Empire capable of filling his place.

The foreign relations of the Empire seem to have undergone lately, many important, and doubtless valuable alterations:—the mediation of Great Britain and Russia had been accepted by the Turkish and Persian Monarchs, and the war in Syria brought to a close. The long-pending commercial treaty with Portugal had been concluded, and a new commercial treaty founded on concessions has been effected with Russia which will reopen that Empire to our commodities. And the Chinese treaty has opened a wide, and in all probability a profitable field to English enterprise.

This brings us to our final consideration, the prospects of the North American Colonies, and here we will observe that what we have ever predicted—*aye, predicted when we were sneered at for our opinions*—is actually taking place, viz:—a resuscitation of our timber trade brought about thus early by Sir Robert Peel's new tariff! St. John Pine of moderate size is now in good demand at from 18-1-2d to 19-1-2d per foot, equal to 20-1-2d and 21-1-2d under the old tariff, and prices rapidly advancing, having risen a penny per foot during the last month! Our deals too are in good demand at remunerating prices, and from the anticipated reaction in mercantile affairs, and the tremendous number of vessels wrecked during the last autumn and current winter, we expect ere long to see once more our wharves and ship-yards present a scene of bustle and activity. These, notwithstanding the gloom is not yet cleared away, are joyous news for the Colonies, the only item besides of importance to them is the appointment of the new Governor General, Sir Charles Metcalfe is said to be a man of intelligence and great decision of character, and was formerly Governor of Jamaica; he was then a Whig, and we know not whether he has read his political recantation or not, although from his present appointment we should presume he had. We shall avoid expressing any opinion of him until he arrives and gives evidence of what may be expected from his administration, meantime we console ourselves with this reflection that he cannot possibly be worse than his predecessor.

The Bill providing for the vacation of members' seats on their accepting office, and which was sent home to receive the Royal assent, has been returned by Lord Stanley with an intimation that he does not understand it! In reference to his Lordship says:—"I should have supposed that the words 'Public Works' as employed in this Act were used as synonymous with the words 'Government Works,' had it not been that Government Works are mentioned immediately afterwards as the subject of an additional and distinct provision." His Lordship also states that the Speaker's privileges are not properly defined, and for these reasons he sends the Bill back for reconsideration, but stating at the same time that it shall remain in force until it shall have been brought under the revision of the Provincial Legislature.

It must be very gratifying to the feelings of our Legislators, as well as a very flattering compliment, surely, to be told that they cannot concoct a Bill in plain English so as to render it intelligible! Why, at this rate New Brunswick will soon bear the palm from the neighbouring Colonies, for talent as well as patriotism, and we would recommend Her Majesty's Ministers, if they have any difficult international question to settle, requiring more than ordinary diplomatic skill and shrewdness, to employ some one of our Blue-Nose tacticians and linguists.

POSTAGE ON NEWSPAPERS.—Our House of Assembly has at length taken the subject of Newspaper Postage into consideration, and the handsome manner in which Mr. Barberie introduced the subject deserves the highest encomium, not only from the Provincial Press, but from the whole population of British North America. We fully agree with the honorable gentleman when he says "It is a tax on knowledge," for where newspapers are, neither display or licentious—which we believe may be said of the press in this Province generally—there is more useful information to be gained through their instrumentality than by any other means, especially among the working classes whose daily avocations preclude the possibility of their applying themselves to close or arduous study, while to take up a newspaper and peruse for a leisure hour is to them a source of amusement and relaxation. But Mr. Barberie omitted

one feature; it is a tax on the knowledge of country people only, who are obliged to pay 2s. 6d. annually for a paper more than is paid by a City subscriber.

It came out in the course of debate that there is no law for taxing newspapers in the Colonies, but that it is an understanding entered into between the deputy Postmaster General and his subordinates, now though we have always experienced good treatment from the Post office department and therefore wish to remain on good terms with those connected with it, we must say that this requisite of theirs should be immediately abolished, and if necessary a salary be paid them instead.

We hope our contemporaries will join us in calling for reform on this subject, and we have no doubt if an address is laid at the foot of the throne by our Legislative Bodies, but it will be promptly responded to.

FINANCE.—While our present House of Assembly seem to be really in earnest in their endeavours to redeem the credit of the Province by curtailing every unnecessary expense, it is amusing to see the conduct of some of the old members, and especially of L. A. Wilmot, Esq., he is very busy just now crying out for retrenchment and reform, but why did he not think of it before? There was not a member in the House during the sittings of the last Assembly, more reckless of the public monies than this gentleman; and it looks suspicious in the present session to see him voting for retrenchment in the civil list department &c., when two years ago he was the leader—nay, the prime mover—in voting away thousands after thousands for contingencies, service of Plate &c. He may have determined—though we doubt it much—to "lead a new life," but if he has, most unfortunately his repentance comes too late.

NEW AND OLD MEMBERS.—Some sparring took place in the House a week or two since, between the Hon. Charles Simonds and Mr. Hazen; Mr. Simonds proposed that the new members should propose some plan to remove our present embarrassments, as they had promised so much on the *Hustings*! Mr. Hazen instantly retorted, saying he thought the Hon. Gentleman himself would have done that business, since he had stated in his electioneering address that it was for this express purpose he again solicited their suffrages! The manner in which Mr. Hazen replied was extremely happy, and we are much mistaken if the old fox did not catch a tartar. As for another of the new members (Mr. Payne) we would advise him to keep his seat till others have spoken, then perhaps he will not be under the necessity of shifting like the wind to the four quarters of the horizon, in the short space of half an hour.

DR. CESNER'S GEOLOGICAL REPORT.—We have been favoured with a new series of this work just published by Mr. Chub. The work is neatly got up and reflects credit both on the author and publisher; it is lucid, comprehensive, and entertaining, and should find a place in every library in the Province.

AMATEUR THEATRE.—On Monday evening last was played, *Wenlock of Wenlock*, and the *Farce of Miss in her Teens*. The play went off well, frequently eliciting bursts of applause; the characters especially of Wenlock, Wolfe, and Lady Rowena, exceeded any thing which could be expected of Amateurs. But the farce was evidently too hurriedly got up, and the actors depended too much on the prompter to perform with honour (to themselves or satisfaction to the audience)—we would advise a little more attention to rehearsals. The audience though not so numerous as we would wish to see it, was a respectable one, and appeared to enjoy themselves. We understand that this evening the Society will perform *The Golden Farmer*, and *The Irishman in London*.

We must apologize to our Subscribers for sending out a small sheet, for several weeks past, it was not in our power to issue a larger one, there being no paper for sale in the City; we trust the like will not occur again. We have now received a large supply from the United States.

A quantity of Legislative and other matter, prepared for this day's paper, has been crowded out, to make room for European News.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Saturday the 4th inst., Mr. James Hennigar Sulis, youngest son of Mr. Daniel Sulis, of Hillsburg, N. S., a promising young man of 18 years of age, fell overboard from the *Schr. Catherine*, Capt. W. Sulis, on her passage from Digby to Eastport, and was drowned. The wind was blowing very heavy at the time and no effort could be made to save him. The vessel was 20 miles from Digby, and after the accident immediately returned to convey to his bereaved parents, three brothers and three sisters, the heart rending intelligence.—*Observer*.

SOUTHWARK ABDUCTION CASE.—THE ABDUCTOR SEEN DEAD BY THE BROTHER OF THE YOUNG LADY.—The affair, involving the suspected abduction of a young lady of Southwark which has created so much excitement in that district, and caused so much talk and speculation all over the city, since Monday last has had an awful termination.

Hutchinson Heberton, the individual who was alleged to have abducted the young lady, last evening fell by the hand of the brother of the latter, having been shot dead by him in a close carriage, in which he was being privately conveyed out of the city by a friend on board the steam ferry boat John Fitch.—The occurrence took place just as the boat, which had left Market Street Wharf about six o'clock, was coming into the slip at Camden.

We forbear at present saying more of the matter than to give briefly the particulars. The name of the brother who committed this deed is Hall W. Mercer, clerk in the store of Carson & Newbold, South Wharves. He had been pursuing the rogue Heberton for two or three days. He proposed to fight him but could not bring him to the field. He then determined to revenge summarily the outrage upon the fair fame of his family, and receiving intelligence of Heberton's intended flight to New Jersey, he laid his plans.

A carriage was hired by a legal friend of Heberton, which was driven all about town. Then it drew up to the lawyer's door. Heberton got in. The blinds were closed. The carriage drove down to the ferry boat John Fitch. In the meantime Mercer had taken a position on board the boat, behind a coal-box.—There he remained unobserved until the boat neared the Camden Ferry. He then stepped forward, presented a revolving pistol, and discharged four of its barrels into the carriage. The first ball entered Heberton's body just under the left shoulder blade passing through the blinds of the carriage. The second penetrated the body, the third and fourth the door of the vehicle.

Heberton was conveyed, as soon as the boat reached the shore, to Cate's tavern, where he breathed his last in about ten minutes. Mercer was immediately taken into custody. When the New York boat came over, about 11 o'clock last night, the coroner's inquest was investigating the matter at Cate's tavern, and Mercer was still in custody at the tavern, and in a terrible state of excitement.—*Philadelphia Times*.
