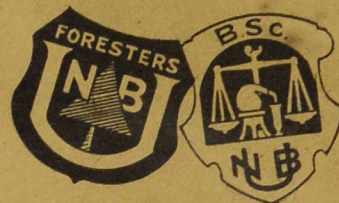
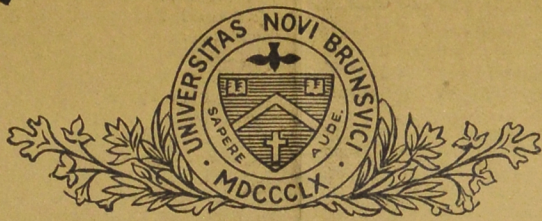

Drive to Make Brunswickan A Separate Institution Beyond Pale of Union

Herb Smith Would Place Paper on Same Status as Engineering and Other Societies—Students to Contract 400 Annual Subscriptions

"That the Brunswickan become a separate unit, similar in character to the Engineering and other University societies and beyond the control of the student body" was advocated by Herb Smith in an address before the Union at its opening meeting. Pres. March said that this would necessitate a change in the constitution and that he would post notice of the amendment before the next meeting when the motion stated above could come before the Union and be voted on.

MUST CONTRACT

Mr. Smith stated that he made the proposal on the condition that the Students' Union contract for the purchase of 400 subscriptions of the Brunswickan. There was no objection to this and so the Brunswickan will go on as before except that it will be independent. As Sam Weller says in Dickens' Pickwick Papers "the advantage of the plan is obvious." Everyone interested in newspaper work will become members of the Brunswickan Society and automatically members of the staff of the paper and will help in writing articles and gathering news. Thus the Brunswickan will become a magnet drawing out literary ability and talent which previously has lain dormant. Judging from the applause which greeted the proposal of Mr. Smith the measure will undoubtedly be adopted unanimously at tomorrow's meeting.

Saint John Trojans Defeated In Listless Game Saturday By Burdo's New Aggregation

U. N. B. Scores Two Tries for 6-0 Win—Poor Game from the Grandstand—Visitors Strong Defensively with Little Attacking Strength

Carrying the play to their opponents all the way the 1931 Red and Black fifteen scored two tries, one in each half and both unconverted, to defeat the Saint John Trojans 6-0 at College Field Saturday afternoon.

The game being the first of the season was not a good one to watch, but it gave us an opportunity to try out candidates for the different positions under actual fire.

Burdo had twenty-nine men ready but through an agreement with the Trojan management used twenty-one, as the Saint John team carried only one sub.

The College team as it showed, was stronger forward than back. There was abundant weight in the scrum which appeared in a two-line formation to meet the new rule re heeling. A heated debate arose and a large number of students took part. One man created quite a stir when he suggested as a measure of economy, that U. N. B. confine her efforts this year to the winning of the Maritime Intercollegiate Championship. This was a sensible suggestion but was hooted down. A large number were in favor of entering into the McCurdy Cup play-downs but were definitely opposed to U. N. B. continuing as a McTier Cup entrant. Changes in Constitution

At a meeting of the U. N. B. Dramatic Society on October 1st the year's programme of three one-act plays, one main production, and a costume ball was announced. Changes in the constitution of the Society regarding membership will be made in March. A. H. Walker was elected stage manager for this year.

The three one-act plays are to be produced on Tuesday, Nov. 3rd. The date for the annual premier production is not definitely determined, but it is expected to be about the last of February. The society is considering the possibility of giving a costume ball some time during the week of the play.

It was pointed out by the President, Philip Golding, that every member of the Students' Union is "ipso facto" an associate member of the society, but that only those who have done work for the organization are entitled to vote upon any matter in connection with the society. Members who have acted or assisted in plays are really considered registered but will not be so technically until the constitution is amended in March.
