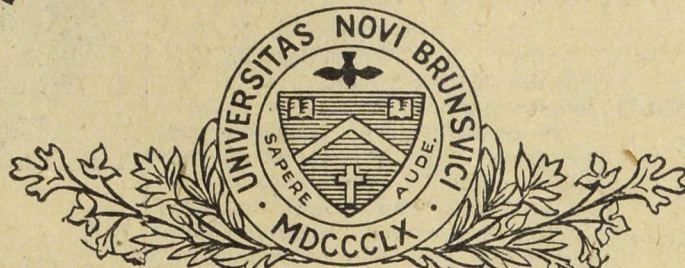

DRAMATIC CLUB SELECTS THREE ONE-ACT PLAYS

Three one-act plays of an entirely new type to those previously produced by the Dramatic Society are to be presented in the Normal School towards the end of November.

The plays selected are as follows:

"A King's Hard Bargain" by Lt. Col. W. P. Drury. To be produced by Dr. R. H. Wright. A drama in three scenes (but no intervals); "What Money?" written and produced by Mrs. B. S. Keirstead; a murder play in a local setting; "Suppressed Desires" by Susan Glaspell. To be produced by R. Bayley or A. H. Walker. An entirely new type of comedy. A high royalty play and well worth it.

The casts for the individual plays have not as yet been selected, but try-outs are being carried on this week by the various directors.

Council Debates, When Is A Grad. Not A Graduate?

At a short Students' Council meeting held Tuesday noon, the question of those who have not as yet signed levy slips was brought forward and a discussion was carried out regarding those on the black list, generally classed as "graduate students". The problem at hand was to interpret fully the terms "graduate student" and "under-graduate", as these terms apply to students who have already completed one course at the University and are seeking exemption from the under-graduate levy, on the grounds that they are graduates. It was finally decided that students proceeding towards a higher degree in the institution, are "graduate students". Those taking lectures towards another degree along separate lines from those in which they have already graduated, are "undergraduates" however, in that they are not taking up advanced study towards higher degrees, and are eligible for participation in the various sports and activities of the college. U. N. B. TEAM PRESENT HOLDERS OF DOMINION CHAMPIONSHIP

Although the spectacular high scores and frequent "possibles" of the last year's practice shoots have been noticeably lacking in the results of this year's turnouts at the Devon Ranges, the competition to be shot-off next Saturday is being looked forward to with the greatest of interest and high hopes are being entertained that the U. N. B. Rifle Association team will retain the Dominion Championship Cup, won last year.

THE COMPETITION

The competition to be shot Saturday is the U. N. B. section of the Dominion Inter-University

Competition which is carried out every year following a series of outdoor practice shoots. The competition is open to any university in Canada. The eight men obtaining the highest scores in the shoot comprise the team, and their average is the basis upon which the competition is judged. The entire shoot is under the supervision of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association and all team scores are sent to Ottawa where they are checked, scores compared and the award of Dominion Cup made public. This cup is put up for competition each year and individual cups are provided for each member. (Continued on Page Five)

ENG. SOCIETY PROPOSE TRIP TO SAINT JOHN

Senior and Junior members of the Engineering Society will in all probability make a short visit to Saint John on Friday, if plans under consideration work out as expected. President Craig Hyslop stated earlier this week, that the Society had written to officials of the new Saint John Docks Commission and of a hydro plant located in the outskirts of the city; and that it was expected that the group of students would visit both the hydro plant and the site of the new docks under construction.

Dr. John Stephens and Prof. E. O. Turner are expected to accompany the group on the proposed trip which, in all probability, will be made by automobile.

IMPROVED SCORE FEATURES LAST PRACTICE SHOOT

Scoring showed a decided pick-up over the past few weeks shooting and the Rifle Association Team commenced shaping up in preparation for the Dominion Shoot of Nov. 11, at the practice shoot held at the Devon Ranges on Saturday. Dow Kitchen led the 1st class division and won the spoon with a score of 94, out of a possible 100 on the three ranges shot. Nason shot a 98 which was classed as 92 in the first class, through virtue of his six point handicap; and Cameron shot 96, but is not eligible for prizes as he is a graduate member of the association.

In the second class division the spoon was won by Sansom with a total score of 96, beating by two points the top score of the first division. He was followed by Odell with a score of 85.

Weather for the day's shooting was fair. No mirage was discernable, but a cold wind made proceedings difficult and tended to cut down accuracy on the longer ranges. A good turnout was had however, and the shoot was featured by an exhibition on the 200 yards range by Mr. Harold Parker, of Saint John, a former Bisley Shot. Mr. Parker shot one target and then gave a short, informal address to those present.

ARTS REPRESENTATIVE TO COUNCIL ELECTED

A short meeting of members of the Arts Course was held in the Economics lecture room, Monday noon, and resulted in the election of James Walker (Bookie) Baker as representative to the Student's Council. H. Campbell Creighton was in the chair.

The answers were quite interesting. In general it seems that students wish more sincere, educated sermons; that serious doubts about creeds and dogmas of the church are entertained; that the music is the most popular part of the church program; that college does not tend to strengthen the religious beliefs of the students; and that students seldom or never have intimate talks on religious questions. It was interesting to note that religion seems to restrain the acts of many students, but does not inspire them to nobler ideas. Dr. Keirstead contributes this to the negative type of our preaching.
