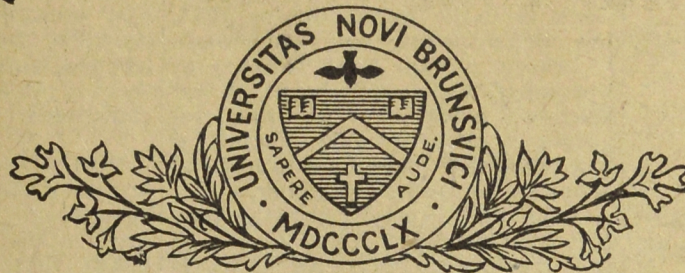

C. O. T. C. HOLDS ANNUAL INSPECTION

Vulgar Views on Vitamins At Variance with Facts

Talk By Prof. Argue
Featured Pre-Med.
Meeting

The last meeting of the Pre-Medical Society for the year was held on Wednesday evening, March 21, at the home of Prof. and Mrs. C. W. Argue, 595 King St. Prof. Argue gave a very interesting address on the subject of vitamins and hormones and their importance to medicine.

He pointed out that what knowledge of these we have is comparatively new, and stressed the fact that the popular notions concerning the nature of vitamins are in many cases greatly at variance with the actual facts. The scientists working upon them are very conservative in their statements, and are quite ready to acknowledge that research work in connection with vitamins has practically just begun—and the same is true of hormones, although perhaps to a less extent.

Hormones are the active principles of the secretions of the endocrine glands, and have peculiar effects upon the growth and metabolic processes of the body. Over-secretion or under-secretion of a hormone will produce a diseased condition. We know of vitamins through the diseased conditions which arise when they are absent in the diet of lower animals or of man. At present, there are quite definite indications that six specific vitamins exist: They have been named A, B, C, D, E, and G. It was once believed that a vitamin F existed, but it has been shown that that substance is an enzyme.

On behalf of the society, Prof. Argue was extended a vote of thanks by the president, J. B. Lunam.

Refreshments were served by Mrs. Argue, and a very pleasant social evening followed, at the conclusion of which the host and hostess were very cordially thanked for their hospitality.

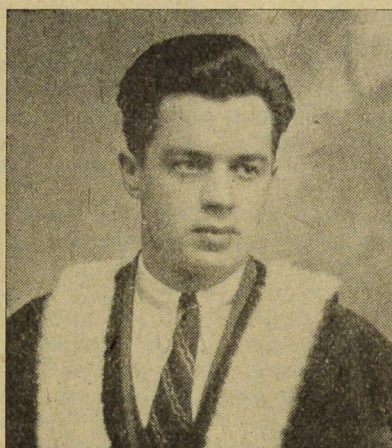

Number Five Platoon Wins Annual Competition

"The manoeuvres were excellent and the precision and timing of all movements would do credit to any permanent force unit", Brigadier General Parsons, District Officer Commanding M. D. No. 7, commented in congratulating the University C. O. T. C. following the annual inspection, held in the Fredericton armouries, yesterday afternoon.

Number five platoon, under the command of Lieut. John Stephens, was selected as the best platoon of the corps by the inspecting officer, after each unit had displayed its movements, and its commanding officer was presented with the Lieutenant-Governor's silver medal as the best platoon commander. Sergeant Ledford Lilley of Number four platoon, was presented with His Honor's bronze medal as the best platoon sergeant of the unit. The presentations were made by Dr. C. C. Jones, honorary colonel of the O. T. C.

The Cameron shield, named in honor of the late Col. Adam Cameron, former commanding officer of the University C. O. T. C., and emblematic of the interclass indoor shooting championship of the university, was presented to the Sophomore rifle team by Brigadier Parsons, and the members of the team, Corp. D. Brown, Corp. E. Nason, Cadet G. Copeland and Cadet F. Duplissa, were congratulated on their showing. Major W. G. Jones, Commanding officer of the O. T. C., then presented Corp. J. Likely, Cadet M. E. Wilson and Cadet Duplissa with shooting distinctions won in the course of the indoor and outdoor rifle contests of the year.

The university contingent consists of about 150 men of all ranks this year and was considered to have made one of the best showings of recent years in the inspection. Capt. W. K. Coombes is adjutant of the corps, and the inspecting officer was accompanied by Capt. Charles Chauveau of Saint John.

U. Of Texas Has Mile Of Tunnels

Austin, Texas.—The campus of the University of Texas is a veritable network of huge underground tunnels, more than a mile of them, crossing and criss-crossing the "Forty Acres," to dispense steam from the university's power plant to the 23 buildings on the campus. Tunnels high enough for a tall man to stand erect in them and six feet wide are used to run the eight-inch steam pipes which carry 200 pounds of steam per square inch to supply heat to the buildings and the smaller pipes which transport hot water for other purposes.
