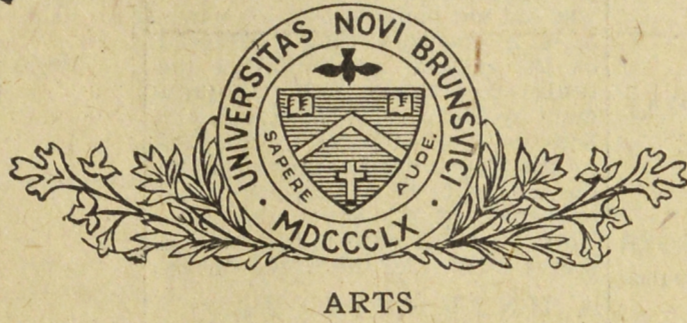

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## STUDENTS UNION TO FINANCE FALL FORMAL

### D.C.R.A. Match Saturday Shot Under Handicap

Shooting under the combined handicap of freezing temperature, a strong wind and loose snow which occasionally blew before the targets in such a way as to obscure all vision, the University Rifle team amassed a total of 776 points out of a possible 840 in the D. C. R. A. competition held at the Devon Ranges last Saturday. Major W. G. Jones, Commanding Officer of the C. O. T. C. unit, expressed himself as thoroughly satisfied with the showing made by the boys, particularly when taking into consideration the adverse weather conditions. The score of 776 is but 23 points lower than that which gave U. N. B. the Dominion trophy last year and smashed all previous records for the intercollegiate shoot. Whether or not the trophy will remain at U. N. B. is yet to be seen, as the scores have to be forwarded to Ottawa to be compared with the results obtained by the other competing universities.

#### EXCEPTIONAL SHOOTING

Douglas Brown, a sophomore of the university and a member of last year's championship team, performed the remarkable feat of putting on ten consecutive bull-eyes, seven on the two-hundred yards range and three upon moving back to the five-hundred. This gave him a perfect score of 35 at 200 yards and with his scores of 33 on both the five and six hundred yards ranges, gave him the leading score of 101. Brown was closely followed by E. M. Nason, another member of last year's team, who scored 100. A feature of Nason's shooting was a perfect 35 on the five hundred yards range. The other scores were somewhat lower, 95 being the lowest score to place on the team.

#### THE COMPETITION

The D. C. R. A. team comprises the leading eight scorers in the match. Their scores are to be sent to the headquarters in Ottawa, and the inter-collegiate results will be announced officially next month. The U. N. B. scores, though below last year's, are outstanding, as unfortunately U. N. B. chose a late date for their shoot-off. The match (Continued on Page Five)

In addition to having played on the rugby team for three years, Fradsham has also put in two seasons with the hockey team, and last spring he was awarded major distinction for participation in athletics. He is a Junior student in the Arts course of the University. Thomas is a member of the Sophomore class and has just completed his second year with the team, on which he fills the position of half. Both he and Fradsham secured positions on the team in their freshman years. In taking over the duties as team Captain, Fradsham succeeds "Bus" McLennan, drop-kicking three-quarter, who is to graduate this coming year.

### Motion Passed Meeting Held Last Friday Noon

#### FALL FORMAL PASS WORD

"Under no consideration will any student attending the university be admitted to the Fall Formal, if he has not signed his levy slip", stated President Arthur Odell in an interview with the Brunswickan on Wednesday. "Passes are to be submitted at the door in lieu of invitations."

It would be advisable therefore, that each and every student who has not already done so should sign the slips within the next few days, and that all should remember to bring along their passes on the eventful night.

That the Fall Formal, the date of which has been set as November 23, will be backed by the Student's Union, was decided at a meeting of that body in the Geology Lecture room on Friday. Other matters taken up at this meeting included the question of a raise in salary for Ted Coffey, intra-mural coach; and the appointment of a chairman to select a committee to look into the matter of the college rink, usually located at College Field for the benefit of Inter class and Farm League Hockey. Henry Colpitts was appointed convener of this committee and is to report to the student's Council at a later date.

#### THE MEETING

The meeting was opened by President C. J. MacLeod who brought to the attention of the students that the Social Committee required the financial support of the Union in carrying out the Fall Formal Dance, proposed earlier in the year. He also presented a recommendation passed by the Student's Council at a meeting held last Tuesday, that the Student's Union grant the Social Committee the sum of one hundred dollars for the purpose of financing the dance. President MacLeod then called upon Arthur Odell, President of the Social Committee, who requested that this money be granted, particularly in that the dance would then be run as a Student's Union function and that all students possessing Union passes would then be admitted free of charge and would each be allowed one invitation. Otherwise he stated, the dance would have to be made public. A motion to the effect that the required money might be granted the Social Committee was made by Baker and seconded by Geo. Gorman. Upon being put to the meeting, the question passed without opposition.

#### SALARY UNCHANGED

The next question to be brought forward was that of a raise in salary for Intra-mural Coach Ted Coffey. Mr. Coffey stated that he was devoting a great deal of time and even some expense, on his own part, to the inter class activity. He referred to the results which he had obtained during the past few weeks and stated that he found that the work required more time and effort to keep up these results than he had anticipated.
