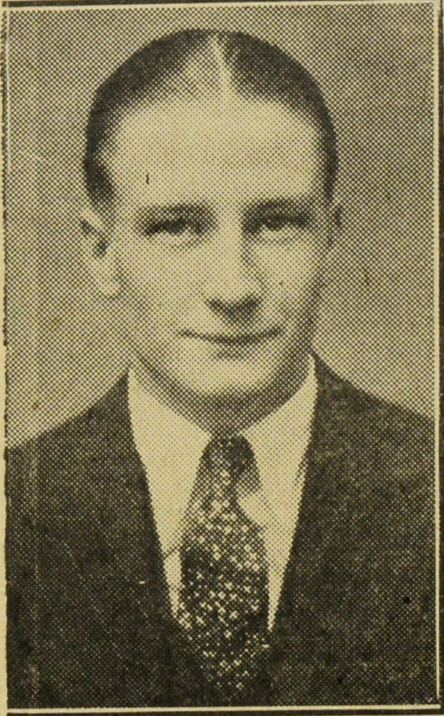

Woodstock Team Downed Varsity By Small Margin

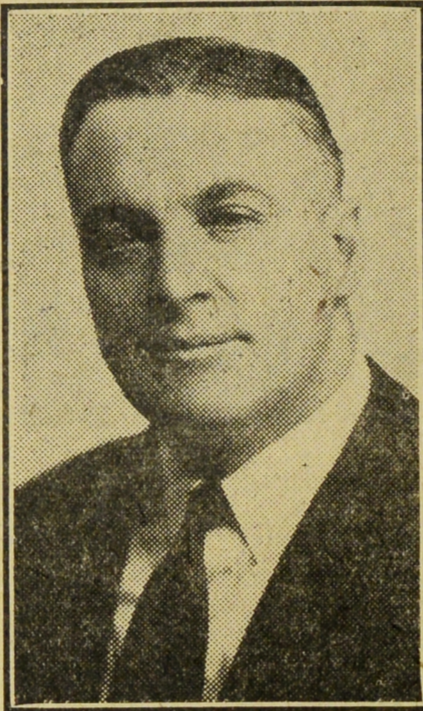

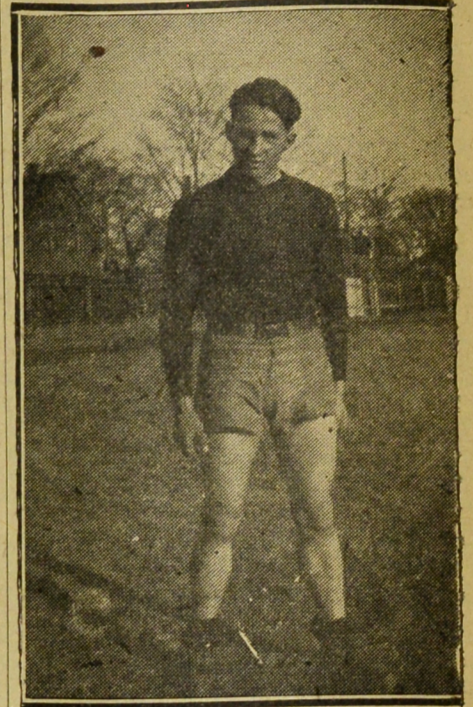

Three men will compose the team for the trip and elimination bouts will be held at the University gymnasium on March 16, to decide team members.

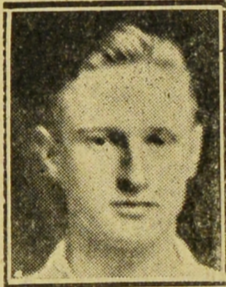
FROSH LEAD BASKETEERS

The Freshman team still holds first place in the Interclass Basketball League, with a total of 3 wins and 1 loss, while the Sophomores come second with 2 wins and 2 losses. The Juniors are third, having won but 1 game, while the Seniors have lost all their contests.

Monday's game was characterized throughout by the frequent use of the whistle by Referee Ted Coffey. The fouls and penalties were about equal for both sides. Neither team's foul shooting was as effective as it should have been, with the Sophs, however, having a slight edge in this respect.
