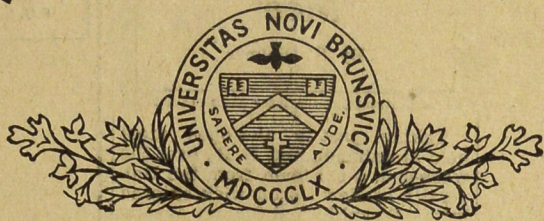

Student Elections to Be Held March 19

Ryan, Simms, Dyer, Nominated For Presidency of Council

Four Students Elected By Acclamation.

University of New Brunswick students will go to the polls on Tuesday March 19th, to choose one of the three nominees as the President of the Students' Representative Council. Those nominated for this office are: Dave Dyer, Bill Ryan and Les Simms. Nominations were received up till 1 p.m. yesterday.

For several other positions on the campus there were acclamations, while keenly contested battles will be waged in some cases. Stan Pringle will take over the position of Vice President of the S. R. C. by acclamation, as will Colin Mackay the job of Treasurer. Students will vote on the names of John Crosbie and Bob McLaughlin for Secretary.

The election for President of the Ladies' Society will be keenly contested with four names to be voted upon by the Co-eds. These are Marj. Barberie, Doris Flieger, Pat Morrison and Becky Watson. The position of Vice-President will be filled by either Mary MacLean or Barb. White while Helen Page will take over secretary-treasurer duties by acclamation.

For officers of the A. A. A. the student body will have their choice of Cliff Hoyt or Bob Murray as President and Manzer Bunker or Jim Morrow as Vice-President.

Jack MacBeath was the only nominee for Secretary-Treasurer of the A. A. A. and will therefore be acclaimed on election day.

It is expected that interest in these elections will be much more keen than in the past years due to the larger number of contested positions. Of the ten to hold these important offices on the campus four will take over by acclamation.

The decision was unanimous.

The occasion was the first in the last five or six years that a ladies' debating team from this university has presented its argument successfully. While in Halifax the visitors were entertained at a reception and shown about various parts of the city and were made to feel at home by the Dal debaters.

Do an Addresses Artsmen On Canada's Tourist Traffic

Announces Gift of \$150. Essay Prize

Speaking on the various aspects of Canada's Tourist Trade, D. Leo Dolan, head of the Canadian Tourist Bureau and recently elected President of the Pan-American Tourist Congress comprising 22 countries, on Wednesday evening addressed members of the U. N. B. Arts Society and several invited guests at a banquet held in the Goody Shop. At the close of his speech Mr. Dolan announced his donation of a \$150. scholarship to be given in even portions over three years to the students of U. N. B. writing the best essays on the subject "Canada's Tourist Industry." Dr. C. C. Jones, who was present at the dinner, as President of the University formally accepted (Continued on Page 5)

St. F. X. Debaters Bow to U.N.B. Here

John Duffie and Bill Ryan of U. N. B. defeated Mark Yeoman and Howard Dumphry of St. Francis Xavier University in a debate held last Friday evening in the Arts Building. U. N. B. upheld the affirmative of the resolution "Resolved that a political amalgamation of the eastern Maritime Provinces would be to the best advantage of their citizens." The judges voted 2 to 1 in favor of U. N. B.

U. N. B. maintained that the proposed amalgamation would make for greater efficiency of administration, reduce the cost of government and increase the bargaining power of the Maritime Provinces within Confederation. St. F. X. argued that the union would not solve the fundamental economic problems of these provinces and also held that the present system should be continued on cultural and sentimental grounds.

Dr. C. C. Jones was chairman. The judges were J. L. Neville, Frank Park and C. A. Tweeddale.

No Bacchusarium—But a Bacchusarium

At a meeting of the male Arts students held last Friday and presided over by the Arts Society President Jim Colby, plans proceeded for the hold of the first annual Bacchusarium, at which it is expected that all male Arts Students will let loose and overflow with exuberance. This festivity, originally called the Bacchusarium, will correspond somewhat to the Forester's Hammerfest and the Engineer's Wassail. A committee consisting of the following: J. C. Hanson, George Cody, Bill Bonnell, John Crosbie was appointed to look after the attendance. It was suggested that the entertainment be open also to Science students, who own, and this will in all probability have no annual function of their own, be acted upon. Another meeting to further the plans and set a definite date will be called in the immediate future.
