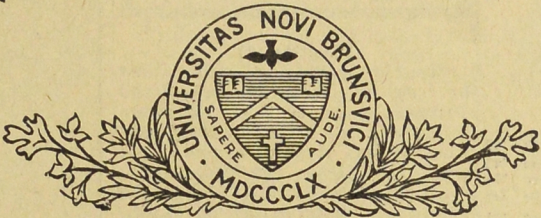

First Canadians Ever to be Represented

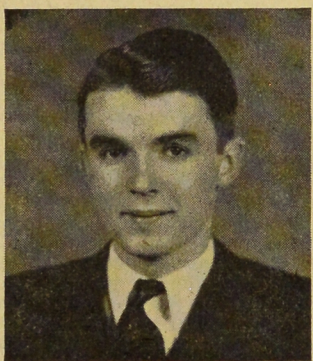
The University of New Brunswick became the first Canadian University ever to be represented at a New England International Relations Club Conference, when a delegation from this university attended the tenth annual Conference held this year at Smith College, Northampton, Mass.

The U. N. B. delegates were Jo Rowan, President of the University's I. R. C., Colin B. Mackay, Editor-in-Chief of the Brunswickan, Lyman Purnell, Francis McLean and Miss Louise Thompson, Faculty advisor.

The Conference began last Friday and ran through until Saturday at noon. It was attended by 150 students representing 45 universities and colleges of the New England States and the University of New Brunswick.

The Conference which was sponsored by the Carnegie Endowment, opened at 10.00 a.m. on Friday with greetings from Smith College, greetings from the president and vice-president of the Conference and remarks given by Miss Amy Hemmings Jones, Representative of the Carnegie Endowment. The delegates then split up into four groups to attend the various Round Tables. These Round Table discussions were grouped under the four following heads: Europe and the Future, The Western Hemisphere, Problems of the Orient, and (Continued on Page Five)

Opera House Scene of "College Night"

Once again the time has come for the Dramatic Society to take the stage. Tonight in the Opera House, the Society is presenting for the entertainment of the student body three one act plays — a tragedy, a mystery and a comedy. The casts include such popular and well known college stars as Doug Gunter, President of the Society, Barb VanDine, last year's winner of the Bailey Cup for the most outstanding performance on the university stage, Sheila Lemont, Horace Jacobson and Bob Evans. All are well-known for their acting ability.

The curtain goes up at 8.15. The first play will be a psychological study "Where the Cross is Made" directed by Mrs. Thompson, the librarian.

The second play is the mystery—a detective drama entitled "Smoke-screen" directed by Miss Doris Bailey, a U. N. B. alumna. Miss Bailey was an active member of the Dramatic Society when she attended the University.

The final play "The Trysting Place" is a comedy by Booth Tarkington. Professor Byron Fieger, who has had a very active career on the stage in the past few years, is the director of this play.

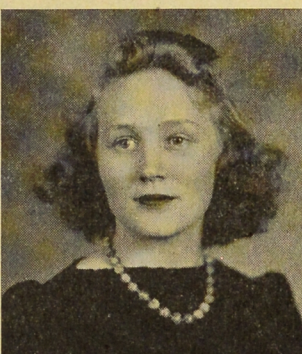
And that means that the deadline for photographs is December 9th. After that date no photograph will be taken.

Bates College to Send Strong Team

Next Thursday evening, November 27th The Men's Debating Society will stage its annual international debate with Bates College in the Memorial Hall. The U. N. B. team of Okechukwu Ikejiani, Linden Peebles and Lloyd Brewer will oppose the Bates varsity squad of Charles Buck, David Nichols and Paul Quimby over the topic "Resolved that the United States in an endeavour to preserve democracy must be willing to actively engage in war against Germany." U.N.B. will uphold the affirmative while the visiting team will defend the negative.

President Roosevelt's "shoot-on-sight" order issued to U. S. warships patrolling the grim gray North Atlantic watching for sudden attacks by U-boats, and counteracted by Hitler's notice that German naval officers who do not resist U. S. naval attacks will be court-martialled, has brought the subject of this debate into sharp relief.

Bates Debaters Invade Canada Many Times

Starting with a 1908 debate with Queen's College of Ontario, Bates men have peacefully invaded Canada many times armed with telling verbal weapons. In 1934, a varsity team of three men, at the invitation of the Canadian Federation of University Students, spanned Canada, winning thirteen out of fourteen debates. Action Delayed re Campus Book Store

Final decision on the possibility of a Campus Book Store was delayed when a scheduled meeting of the Science Club on Tuesday was cancelled because of a poor representation of society members.

The president of the club, Earl Morrison, had called this important meeting at the request of the S. R. C. for the purpose of ascertaining the club's stand on the proposed Campus Book Store.

When interviewed president Morrison had this to say: "After such a good start this year it was most discouraging to see such a small group of students turn up. That they should show such indifference to the welfare of the society of which they are members is indeed disheartening. There will be another meeting in a few days time, and since the S. R. C. wants a decision from the club on this matter, I do hope that a good majority of the society members will attend."

Movies Presented by Major Fred J. Ney

A company of the C. O. T. C. got a break from routine training on Wednesday when they, along with other students, were able to see authentic pictures of the armed forces in action. These pictures were presented by Major Ney distinguished lecturer and traveller. Several students of the university had met Major Ney before the present war, when he was running the Overseas Education League tours. In that capacity he conducted many tours of Canadian students to all parts of Europe.

Major Ney was introduced by President MacKenzie. These films which were in three parts, depicted life in the various branches of the armed forces. The first part, which was new to most students, explained in detail the many island forts with which England is arming her coastline. The second showed the R. C. A. F. in both training and in action. The final part dealt with the recent British raid on the Spittoten islands, off the coast of Norway.

Spitfire Fund Boosted During Last Week

Is Above Total of Last Year at This Time

When interviewed by The Brunswickan, Robert Grant, acting chairman of the Spitfire Fund committee disclosed the financial standing of the fund after the Fall Formal. The total now amounts to approximately \$200.00.

Before last week's dance the figure stood at \$54.00, which had been realized from the holding of two campus dances. At the Fall Formal the encouraging sum of \$146.00 was taken in; \$76.00 from the sale of tickets on the drawing for the corsage of orchids; \$20.00 from the sale of soft drinks; and \$50.13 as the proceeds from the Penny Campaign.

At this date last year the total of the Spitfire Fund was approximately \$150.00. The greater portion of which had accrued from the sale of souvenirs from the flagpole. So far this term the support of the student body, notwithstanding the incomplete success of the Penny Campaign, has been extremely good; while the organization of the Spitfire Fund committee itself has been complete and well balanced.

Penny Campaign is Below Objective

The result of the Cup of Coppers Campaign although not yet announced officially is, according to reliable sources, far below the objective set by the Spitfire Committee. The climax of the drive was reached at the Fall Formal last Friday evening where the air was almost literally filled with pennies as all change at the door, and check-room, and from the sale of soft drinks and corsage tickets was given out in coppers. It is understood however that the final count of pennies in the Cup showed a total of 5,013 pennies, whereas the objective set was 10,000.

In spite of not reaching its objective, the Penny Drive did boost the Spitfire Fund quite considerably and together with the sums realized in other directions, the Penny Week proved quite profitable to the Fund.
