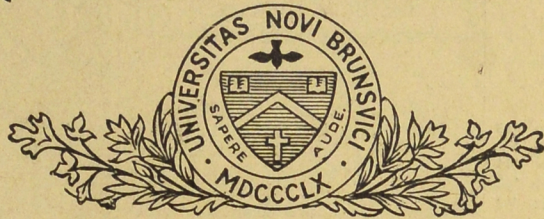

FINAL BUDGET MEETING SET FOR WEDNESDAY

U.N.B. MAY HAVE AIR TRAINING

U.N.B. students may soon be able to take Airforce Training according to information that The Brunswickan has received from Dr. MacKenzie and Major Jones. The President stated that a committee composed of faculty members and the heads of the C.O.T.C. had discussed the plan thoroughly and had written to Ottawa concerning the matter.

This nation-wide Air Training Plan for Universities, approved by the Minister of Defence, has already been adopted at the University of Toronto.

The course covers the entire work done at the Initial Training Schools of the R.C.A.F. There would be 112 hours of instruction: approximately the same as the amount of time put into military training. However, only those who took their compulsory training requirements last year will be able to cover the air training course during the current year. That is last year's work will exempt students from taking the elementary drill as given in the Initial Training Centres. At the end of the Academic year there will be a two-week air training camp where students will be given practical experience.

Probably such courses as Navigation, Airmanship, Theory of Flight and Engines would be included in (Continued on Page Five)

The success of this door-to-door drive — perhaps the greatest single salvage effort Montreal has yet seen — was one agreeable result of an effort to impress the incoming class with the seriousness of their position, as students, in this year of war.

U.N.B. FACULTY IN FAVOUR OF FOUNDERS' DAY

"I would be in favour of some recognition of those to whom we owe so much," said Dr. MacKenzie when asked on Wednesday whether or not he thought a Founders' Day should be established at this University. Here is what the President said:

"I have been asked to give my opinion of the suggestion to establish a Founders' Day at the University of New Brunswick. My views on this matter would be largely determined by the views of others who have had longer and more intimate associations with U.N.B. than I have had. In the final analysis it would depend upon whether any considerable number of the student body were interested in it.

"Personally I would be in favour of some such recognition of those to whom we owe so much. No college or university in Canada has a longer history or finer traditions than our own and our roll of graduates contains many illustrious names. Formerly I believe it was customary to have someone deliver an address in honour of our founders at Encaenia. Because of the increasing time necessary for these ceremonies — due to increasing numbers of graduates — this was abandoned. If another day were set apart, one which might perhaps coincide with a meeting of the Senate and if an appropriate programme were arranged by the undergraduates and graduates, I believe such an occasion would be both interesting and valuable both to the student body and to the University itself. If it is decided to carry out this proposal, I will be (Continued on Page Five)

Budget Shows Deficit of \$186.05

The S. R. C. and interested students had their first chance to discuss the proposed fall budget when the preliminary budgets were presented by Treasurer Arnie McAllister last Wednesday evening. President Cameron of the S. R. C. was in the chair and all budgets were taken up in detail.

The majority of discussion centered around the newly introduced badminton budget, the basketball budget and the budget presented by the President of the Social Committee. The old question of why debates cannot be held in one of the University buildings was again raised. Sports managers and various heads of organizations presenting budgets were called upon to explain the items in their accounts.

As the budget now stands there is a deficit of \$186.05. What will be done to straighten out this situation will be decided at the final budget meeting, set by the Council for next Wednesday evening.
