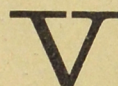
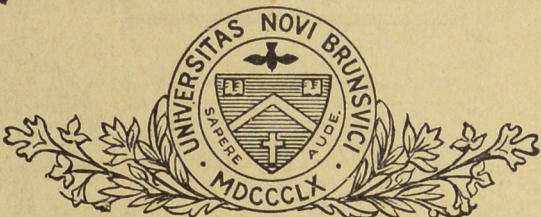

MEMORIAL GYM SCENE OF FORMAL TONIGHT

Draw on Orchid to Replace Corsages

Ken Jones Orchestra to Furnish Music

The Fall Formal, leading social event of the first term, will be held tonight on the spacious floor of the New Gym, beginning at nine o'clock. Ken Jones and his orchestra will provide the music for this popular affair, which will be presented without the usual decorations for reasons of economy.

In an interview with the Brunswickan, Bob Grant, chairman of the Social Committee, stated that all students will be admitted free of charge, and that outside bids will be sold at the door. Mr. Grant also stated that bids to the dance have been made available to the airmen stationed on the campus, a large number of whom are expected to attend.

The Formal will mark the end of the "Cup of Coppers" drive, which is being sponsored by the Spitfire Committee. The cup will be on display throughout the dance. In addition, tickets will be sold at fifty cents each on a large corsage of orchids, the proceeds of which will be added to the Spitfire Fund.

Sgt.-Pilot Trafford Killed in Action

With the announcement of the death of Sergeant-Pilot Ivan Raymond Trafford, R.C.A.F., one more name has been added to the growing list of U. N. B. men who have laid down their lives in this titanic struggle.

Sergeant-Pilot Trafford was killed in action overseas on November 7. He had only recently gone overseas having received his wings at Dunnville, Ont., in August of this year.

He was a member of the class of '43. Entering the University in the fall of 1939, he left in the following spring to join the Royal Canadian Air Force. While at U.N.B. he was a student of Forestry.

Sergeant-Pilot Trafford is the ninth U.N.B. man to have been killed since the outbreak of hostilities in 1939. They are: James Trites '30, R. Drury Anderson '33, H. Kenneth Corbett '38, N. Douglas Breen '38, Lawrence A. Clements '39, John A. Watson '40, Winslow G. Gilbert '43, J. Graham Rogers '43, Ivan R. Trafford '43.

Debaters Chosen To Meet St. F. X.

Last evening the Men's Debating Society held a sparsely attended trial debate to choose a two man team to meet St. Francis Xavier at Antigonish, Nova Scotia, on November 27th. Linden Peebles, president of the society acted as chairman.

Professor Smethurst and Dr. Bailey, faculty advisors to the club, were in attendance. The topic for debate was: "Resolved that professors impart more knowledge to students than do text books." In the intercollegiate encounter U. N. B. will uphold the affirmative.

C.O.T.C. Marches On November 11

Appearance Smart in Huge Parade

On Remembrance Day a volunteer group from the U.N.B. Contingent of the Canadian Officers Training Corps participated in the largest parade of the armed forces ever held in the city of Fredericton. The University was extremely well represented by a company of 100 men who marched under the command of Lieutenant Eric T. Skelton. Lieutenant Hudson Wilt was second in command.

The men, clad in officers' uniforms, were drawn up on Queen Square along with the R.C.A.F. squadron stationed at the University. From here the C.O.T.C. marched to Phoenix Square. Together with the units from the Canadian Active and Reserve Armies, they paraded to the Cenotaph.

After the ceremonies, the parade moved down Queen Street and past the saluting base at City Hall, where Lieutenant Governor Clark took the salute. At the corner of York and Queen Streets the U. N. B. Company broke away from the parade and marched back to Queen Square where it was dismissed.

This is the second occasion in the history of the unit that the C. O. T. C. has had the honour of marching on Remembrance Day. The volunteer company was distinctive in its appearance and most certainly helped to uphold the prestige and honour of the unit.

I.R.C. DELEGATES AWAY TO SMITH

To Attend International Relations Conference

For the first time in a great many years U. N. B. delegates are attending a conference of American University students. It is a New England conference of the International Relations Clubs of universities and colleges. The conference is being held at Smith College, Southampton, Mass.

The I.R.C. club of this university has sent four delegates to the conference. They are Jo Rowan, president of the club, Colin B. Mackay, Editor-in-Chief of The Brunswickan, Francis MacLean and Lyman Purnell. Miss Louise Thompson is acting in the capacity of faculty advisor to the delegation.

The students from this campus left yesterday intending to reach Southampton last evening. The conference commences on Friday and finishes Saturday at noon.

U.N.B. is not the only Maritime university to be represented at this Conference. Dalhousie is also sending a delegation, headed by one of its professors, Dr. Mackay. He is to be one of the principal speakers at this conference.

Year Book Com. Announces Plans for Year

At a recent meeting of the 1942 U. N. B. Year Book management further plans were drawn up for this year's publication. Already steps have been taken for the taking of graduate photographs and group pictures.

U.N. B. Prof. On Research Council

The head of U. N. B.'s department of politics and economics, Professor Burton S. Keirstead, has been elected to the Canadian Social Service Research Council according to word received here this week. Campus Book Store Before S. R. C.

Baptist New Rink Manager

The Students' Representative Council held its weekly meeting last Friday in the Economics Lecture room with the president, Alastair Cameron in the chair.

The widely publicized question of a Campus Book Store, recently suggested by the Forestry Association, was brought before the Council by Harry Saunders, president of the Foresters. He stated that it had been suggested that such a book store operate with the view of supplying the students with textbooks at the beginning of the academic year and at a slightly reduced price.

Mr. Saunders said that the Foresters thought that the present method of obtaining books took too much time but that this proposed plan would counteract such a difficulty. The Council decided that the presidents of the Engineering, Forestry and Science faculties should hold meetings to discuss this problem of a Campus Book Store in greater detail, and that the opinions reached should be brought before the S. R. C. at a later date.

The appointment of Alex Baptist as manager of the College Rink for this year was approved. Mr. Baptist will receive a salary of \$50.00. No applications were received for the position of assistant manager; (Continued on Page Five)

DR. HOAR SPEAKS TO SCIENTISTS

Gives Interesting Talk On Human Nutrition

Thursday evening the Scientific Society held its first regular meeting of the term, with Dr. West in the chair. A large number of the society members were in attendance.

The guest speaker, Dr. Hoar of the Department of Biology, took as his subject the "Historical Introduction to the Study of Human Nutrition." This address was the first of a series of seven on this topic. Dr. Hoar explained the false impressions that doctors in the early ages had concerning nutrition. He traced gradually their enlightenment and concluded with a description of present day ideas on nutrition.

During the business session of the meeting a lengthy debate took place regarding the advisability of sending a telegram of encouragement to the scientists of the U. S. S. R. On a vote by the members this motion was defeated.

The society decided that before a meeting, mimeographed sheets containing a summary of the speech to be delivered would be distributed to all the members.

MacKenzie was on hand for the official opening of the drive and addressed a few appropriate remarks to the assembled throng of enthusiastic and eager students. Despite the absence of a large part of the student body due to the Remembrance Day holiday, the stack of pennies in the cup increased by leaps and bounds during the first day of the campaign and at the close of the day it was

CAMPUS CLIPPINGS

According to the daily newspapers one-fifth of Harvard's undergraduates have voted in favour of an immediate declaration of war. Two-fifths favour repeal of the Neutrality Act. Last February only one-twentieth wanted a declaration of war. It seems as if the trend is very much one way even though the actual progress of the war is improving steadily for the democracies.

Recently McGill University held a Penny Campaign. Their gigantic drive netted them the amazing total of \$6,000 pennies. Congratulations are owing to the members of the campaign committee for their very complete organization in this ingenious scheme.

A news despatch from Ottawa has revealed a plan which should prove of great interest to men students attending universities in Canada. The Canadian government has decided to recompense each male student who leaves his studies to join the armed forces. According to the announcement, after the present conflict has been terminated any student who failed to finish his academic course at college and desires to continue with his studies will receive nine dollars a week when he returns to the university. This also applies to post-graduate work.

Last week Queen's University held a Blood Bank Rally in connection with the campaign to secure voluntary blood donations from students to send overseas. The well arranged and highly informative rally sponsored by the Queen's Students Assembly was the result of co-operation among various societies both on and off the campus. Guest speakers outlined the pertinent features of voluntary blood donations.
