

All Out For Varsity Victory On Saturday

The U.N.B. football season for 1941 winds up tomorrow with the annual U.N.B.-Mt. A. football classic. And so this game, which starts at 2.30 p.m., on College Field, will be the last chance for local fans to see the Red and Black squad in action. It was half a century ago that the first rugby battle between these two Universities took place.

The U. N. B. team indeed has an enviable record for this fall. They have played four games and come

through the winner in each of these encounters. But more than that—the U. N. B. line has not been crossed by any player of any opposing team to date. Surely a team with such a record deserves the support of all the students.

"We'll have a very good chance Saturday" said Coach "Howie" Ryan when interviewed on the coming grid battle. Ryan went on to say: "Although we have a young team that is lacking in experience, nevertheless they seem to be able

to play heads-up football when it comes to actual games. In all games to date the U. N. B. football team has shown great speed and aggressiveness and they should stand a good 50-50 chance against Mt. A. Taken as a whole we have one of the fastest backfields in action today."

"It is very hard on a University football team to play a schedule such as ours has been this year, with only the few practices that the team has had it is hard to keep

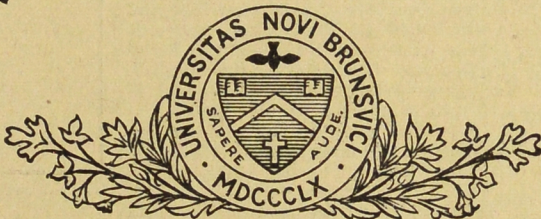
up interest in the game. Nevertheless, the boys have done a great job of it this year."

Micklem of Hansfield College, Oxford with emphasis on the relation of religion with all branches of study and its development with modern medical and scientific thought. In the evening special guests and delegates were presented to Principal Wallace and Chancellor C. A. Dunning, who delivered the address of welcome. Dunning emphasized the importance of intellectual freedom stating that if conscription of the mind is forced upon Queen's, Queen's ceases to be. McAllister informed the bank that the S. R. C. would be most happy to take the money, but he was told that the only way that it could be removed was by the officials of the swimming club.

That was how things stood when the matter was presented to the S. R. C. last Friday. At that meeting President Cameron declared that the only way to clear things up was for the Council to appoint some officials of a U. N. B. Swimming Club. The S. R. C. elected Robert H. B. McLaughlin to the position of president, and Colin B. Mackay to the position of treasurer. The new executive began work immediately and now Mr. McAllister has increased his bank balance by the amount of \$10.40.

Mr. McLaughlin, when interviewed by The Brunswickan stated that as yet his plans for the club during the coming year were very indefinite. However, he said that he hoped to arrange some swimming meets between the executive and the Co-ed swimming team.

Decided at Meeting of Ladies Society

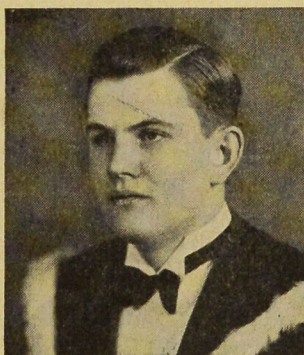
