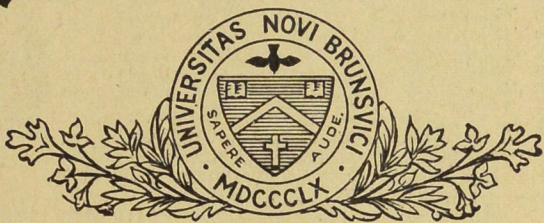

U. N. B. Deficit Due to Increased Services

President Presents Report at Annual Senate Meeting

At the annual meeting of the University of N. B. Senate, held Tuesday morning in the University library, it was announced by the President, Dr. MacKenzie, that a considerable deficit in the general accounts had been incurred during the past year.

Dr. MacKenzie presented to the Senate his report for the academic year 1940-41, while the financial statement was presented by the registrar, Joseph W. Sears. The increased deficit was shown to be due largely to the extra services that the University had undertaken in connection with the war effort.

Dr. John Stephens reported on the work done during the summer carrying out needed repairs to the Arts Building. This was done with funds provided by the special grant of \$10,000 by the province.

Saint John Teachers Hear Addresses By Dr. MacKenzie

During the past week-end the President delivered two addresses to Provincial organizations. On Saturday evening he addressed the Saint John Teachers' Association while on Sunday he journeyed to Moncton to address the Maritime Young Men's Conference.

To the Saint John Teachers Dr. MacKenzie declared: "Preparation of youth to make the maximum contribution to the nation is the function of education in wartime." Such a duty might be carried out most effectively, the President suggested, by a greater emphasis on health nutrition, by making a special effort to keep pupils in school for a sufficient period and by lending support to the adult education movement.

S.C.M. PROGRAM GETS UNDERWAY

Dr. MacMillan to Spend Week-end on Campus

In an interview with The Brunswickan, Lloyd Smith, President of the S. C. M., outlined briefly the activities of the club for this week-end. He stated that Dr. Hugh MacMillan, National Secretary of the Student Christian Movement would be present on the campus until Monday.

Dr. MacMillan is well known to U. N. B. students because of his visit here last year when he addressed various college societies. This evening he will show slides on "the work of the Canadian Churches" (at the Young People's meeting of Saint Paul's Church). On Saturday next members of the S. C. M. will conduct a Student Service in the George Street Church, at which Dr. MacMillan will be the special speaker.

A hike is scheduled for Saturday afternoon to Woodbridge's Camp. At this meeting Lloyd Smith will give a report on the Couchiching Conference at which he was a delegate this summer.

The President of the S. C. M. has extended a cordial invitation to all the students of the University to attend these meetings and to participate in the discussions.

All Classes Discuss Proposed Budgets

The Senior Class met on Friday with President Manzer Bunker in the chair, and several changes in the budget were favoured. The Seniors decided that the Badminton Budget over which much controversy has arisen, should be passed as it stood. Also that the item from the Men's Basketball budget, for 10 sweatshirts (\$20.00) be cut. Men's Debating came in for its share of economizing with the items of advertising, entertainment and Normal School Hall totalling \$7.05 being struck off. It was agreed, too, that the Social Committee should be deprived of refreshments (\$30.00) and help (\$21.00) thus lowering the proposed budget considerably.

The Juniors held their meeting on Tuesday with Herbert Loane presiding. Many of the changes favoured by the Seniors were also adopted by the Junior Class including the cut in Basketball of twenty dollars, the Debating Society cut of \$7.50, The Badminton budget of \$75.00 was passed as it was presented at the preliminary meeting and it was urged that the Social Committee exercise the strictest economy in regard to the orchestra for the Fall Formal.

The Sophs. with Malcolm McKay in the chair also voted in favour of badminton, but favoured a cut in Basketball, Debating and Social Committee.

The Freshman Meeting took place on Friday and the newly elected president, Joe Richards, was in charge of proceedings. The Frosh were in favour of reducing the Badminton grant to \$50.00 instead of \$75.00; they also urged cuts in Basketball and Debating.

U. N. B. President Away to Queens

On Wednesday, Dr. MacKenzie left for Kingston, Ontario, where he will attend Centenary Celebrations at Queen's University. It was learned at the University office that the President will be absent from the campus until Monday.

While at Queens President MacKenzie will deliver a short address and will extend greetings to that University on behalf of the University of New Brunswick.

MORE AIRMEN ARRIVE ON MON.

On Monday 75 more members of the R. C. A. F. will move onto the U. N. B. campus to begin their radio technicians course. This group will remain at the University for four months and during that period will receive instruction from both Airforce personnel and members of the Engineering faculty. This group, as the preceding one will be quartered in the gym and will eat their meals in the Lady Beaverbrook Residence.

Today the present group of 48 airmen stationed in the Lady Beaverbrook Gymnasium will leave for out points having recently written exams to complete their four months course. Those who successfully passed their examinations will now hold the rank of LAC, B class.

Of the present group of 48, 12 spent the whole four months of their course at this University while the remaining 36 spent the summer months studying at Dal.

Budget Cut By Approximately \$200.00

The Fall budget of the Students' Representative Council was passed by that body at the final budget meeting held on Wednesday evening with President Alastair Cameron in the chair. Although the meeting was marked by apparent disregard for either the business at hand or the repeated requests of the president for order, by the students, nevertheless the great majority of the students remained to the last and appeared definitely interested in seeing the budget cut wherever possible.

Approximately \$285.00 was cut from the preliminary budget. The total amount of the budget now stands at \$2,017.90 and instead of a deficit of \$186.05 there is a credit of \$99.00.

At this meeting the president made a statement concerning the bi-weekly dances which may be held "up the hill" this year. He said that Dr. MacKenzie wished to have presented to him a definite plan of the arrangements for such dances before he, and the faculty, could give their final consent. Such dances are to be run by the recently formed Spitfire Committee.

Mr. Bunker, President of the A. A. A., the chairman of the committee appointed to look into the question of insuring members of teams against athletic injuries, presented his report to the Council. He pointed out that it would be absolutely impossible for the Council to pay the whole premium that would be necessary to insure a player, but suggested that some compromise might be reached whereby both the student and the Council could pay something. The report presented by the President of the A. A. A. contained a proposal whereby all students could obtain insurance against injuries at

Committees Appointed to Run U. N. B. War Effort

Spitfire and War Savings Stamp Committee Formed on Campus

At a recent S. R. C. meeting the student body signified unanimously, its intention of contributing the furtherance of Canada's war effort in the same manner as it did last year. It was decided that the Spitfire Fund and War Savings Stamp committees would again function.

On Wednesday, Alastair Cameron, President of the S. R. C. made known the complement of these two committees. The Spitfire Fund committee with Robert Grant as acting chairman is composed of Alec Baptist, Bob McLaughlin, Horace Jacobson and Sheila Lemont. The committee to handle the sale of War Savings Stamps on the

campus is headed by the acting chairman Eric Skelton and comprises also Manzer Bunker and Jo Rowan. Alastair Cameron by virtue of his office as President of the S. R. C. is chairman ex officio of both committees.

According to a ruling of the Students' Council each committee is directly responsible to the S. R. C. and must submit to the Council before the end of October regarding its plans for the coming year. Already the running of a campus bi-weekly dance has been placed in the hands of the Spitfire Fund committee and any profits received from such events will be added to the fund.

Centenary Celebrations At Queens This Week

Honorary Degrees to be Conferred on Governor-General and Princess Alice

Queen's University will be the meeting place of men of international import as it celebrates its Centenary in gala Gaelic fashion. Starting on Thursday, the sixteenth, with a service of Remembrance and Thanksgiving the celebration will continue till Saturday night when a dance reminiscent of those which used to take place after Intercollegiate Football games will be held.

Delegates from the various Dominions of the Commonwealth, Universities and numerous institutions will all participate, each hav-

ing some particular function to perform. On Friday twenty-four Honorary LL.D and D.D. degrees will be conferred, with the Reverend Luther Weigle, Dean, Divinity School, Yale expressing for the D. D.'s and Dr. Camille Roy of Laval and the Hon. J. L. Ralston for the LL.D's their appreciation for the general body. In the evening a banquet will be held in the Gymnasium by the city of Kingston for the Delegates and Special Guests amongst whom will be the Prime Minister and the Hon. Angus Macdonald.

The following day will bring to a close the Centenary Celebrations.
