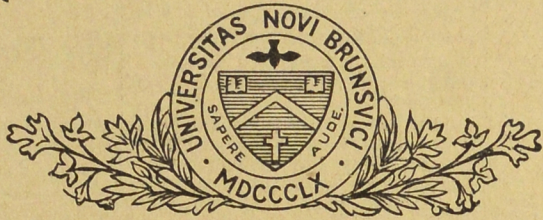

HODGSON, C. U. P. REPRESENT. VISITS U. N. B. CAMPUS

Former Varsity Editor
Seeks to Reorganize
C. U. P.

H. Dent Hodgson, Canadian University Press representative, former editor-in-chief of the Toronto Varsity, author of the C.U.P. handbook, past president of the C.U.P., and now with the Canadian Press, spent two days on the campus this week.

Hodgson will visit all universities in Canada before his tour is over. His purpose is to reorganize the Canadian University Press. Said Hodgson, "While attempting to bite off somewhat more than it found itself able to chew, the Canadian University Press, during its first few years was thoroughly alive to the immediate and possible advantages of inter-collaboration on the part of Canadian College publications. What the early promoters failed to realize fully were the vast differences existing on the various college camp, the consequent differences in the publications they found it suitable to produce and the exact value of an affiliation with other Canadian University newspapers which could result."

"The problems and requirements of the weekly paper published by the comparatively small college, are basically different in character from the problems and requirements which must be faced by the bi-weekly or daily newspaper published by the larger institution."

President Meets Representatives

The University President called representatives of the classes and of the S.R.C. to meet with him on October 2 to discuss a number of subjects in the interests of the students and the University in general. The meeting, strictly informal, was one in which everyone felt that opinions could be expressed freely and was a good indication of an attitude of friendship and cooperation between the faculty and the students.

The decorating of the main central room of the arts building received first attention and the president mentioned a possibility of obtaining some original oil paintings for the walls. With this he expressed his fears of the possibility of such paintings being defaced by young vandals with which the University has had trouble from time to time. The suggestion was made that the pictures be hung as high on the walls as was deemed advisable and that any youngsters destructively inclined should be run off the campus quickly and without ceremony.

As some of you already know, the Arts building was threatened by fire a short time ago. The cause of the blaze was a combination of waste paper and the carelessness of a smoker. It was decided that cigarette-but containers were to be placed at convenient places throughout the building, and it is hoped that the students will take fullest advantage of these for their own benefit. It was suggested also, that the students be cautioned on the carelessness with which waste paper is disposed of in the University buildings. Not only do these bits of paper make our buildings untidy but they increase the fire hazard considerably. So, ladies and gentlemen, ash trays for the ashes, waste baskets for the waste paper and our buildings will look better and stand less chance of becoming a heap of charred remains.

At the mentions of a Men's Common Room, the president expressed his regrets at this lack, but stated that the lack of suitable space made such a proposal almost an impossibility. Not only do the men feel the lack of common room but the faculty, as well, could do with a sanctum in which to swap a yarn or two during a spare. At present, no solution to this problem has been brought forward.

President Addresses S. C. M. On Sunday

The opening meeting of the Student Christian Movement for the present year was held last Sunday evening at 8.30 o'clock in the Y.M.C.A. rooms, with Lyman Purnell, president of the Movement, in charge.

The meeting opened with a hearty sing-song of community songs and hymns, led by Elmore Tufts, with Helene Gorham at the piano.

A brief Devotional Period followed, led by the president. It consisted of several opening hymns, scripture reading by Ken Dawson, prayer by the leader, and closed with the hymn "Faith of our Fathers".

Mr. Purnell then extended a welcome to all the students, both new and old, and especially mentioned the Normal Students.

The highlight of the evening was an address by Dr. N. A. M. MacKenzie, who spoke on general problems confronting the youth of today. He first gave a brief outline of the history of the S.C.M., and then went on to discuss several important questions, such as: "What does religion mean to the student?" "Why should we go to S.C.M.?" Toronto, McGill Announce Womens War Training

Labor Minister Mitchell has issued an appeal to students in Quebec and Ontario to help a shortage in harvest labour in Saskatchewan. Students enrolled at McGill University in the faculties of Commerce, Law, Arts and Agriculture will be affected by this appeal. The Commerce and Law students are expected to enlist en masse, while two agriculture students will go, eighty-seven of one hundred and dropping only those who are physically unfit. A probable three hundred will go. French Canadian students were the first to enlist. First, second and third year science students may go but there will be no fourth year Medical, Engineering, Dental or Science students going.

Free transportation will be provided with the exception of \$10 return ticket. Free board and room will also be provided plus a minimum of \$4 daily wages. Truck drivers will receive \$5 and up. Combine operators will receive \$8 and up.

Principal James of McGill University and the Deans were to have addressed a meeting held in Moyse Hall on Thursday. Further details were to have been released at this meeting. Announcement of the departure date was expected from Ottawa on Thursday but as yet no definite word has been received, although it is expected to be on the weekend.

Many co-eds also expressed their desire to be included in the harvesters.

The University of Toronto and Queen's University are experiencing the same situation as at McGill.

Newman Club Holds Business Meeting

The Newman Club held its first meeting of the year Sunday evening in St. Dunstan's rectory. This was a short business meeting and dealt chiefly with organization.

The president, Terry Dalton, welcomed new members and briefly outlined the activities of the club and the general program for the term. The retiring president, Bernard Power, then gave a short sketch of the history of the club at U.N.B. and the program followed last year.

The club chaplain, Capt. the Rev. H. V. Dysart, concluded the meeting with a brief address in which he emphasized the principal aims of the club and offered his full support and help for the year's work.

The officers for this year are President, Terry Dalton; Vice-President, Gerard Mackin; Treasurer, Cletus Hussey; Corresponding Secretary, Art McDermott; Recording Secretary, Tom Feeney. The chairman of the program committee is Catherine Simcock.

For the benefit of the freshmen, the Newman Club is an organization composed of Roman Catholic students of this university. Therefore, every Catholic student is automatically a member of the club and is invited to attend all meetings and to take part in all activities.

Eight Courses Offered by the Military Supplement

War Training for women is slowly but surely getting into full stride throughout Canada. This year, as never before, university women are to play an important part in Canadian Women's War effort.

The Governors of the University of Toronto have announced Compulsory Women's War Training. McGill University authorities have announced that "All Women undergraduates are required to be enrolled in the War Service Program".

As far as possible instruction will be given on Tuesdays and Thursdays 4-6 p.m.

There are eight courses set down by the Military Supplement, and women may enroll in courses of their own choice.

There will be a minimum amount of drill in the Red Cross course and those entering this course for the first time are required to take basic courses in Red Cross Organization, First Aid, Civilian Defence (A.R.P.). Advanced training is given in the second and third years under four sections: Transport, Nursing, Office Administration and Food Administration.

Two courses in which preference is given to students of the third and fourth years are Training as Hospital Nursing Aids and as volunteers in Civic Day Nurseries. The first of these consists of 20 hours lectures and 60 hours hospital ward duty. The second gives 15 hours instruction with additional practice. This course constitutes only one-half the total requirement and must be taken along with one of the short courses.

There are also courses offered in Nutrition, Recreation, Leadership, Civilian Defence, Home Nursing and First Aid. Red Cross sewing under the university Women's War Service Committee is another choice for one half the requirement.

Pre-Med. Soc. Plans Programme for Year

The first meeting of the Pre-Medical Society of this campus was held Wednesday night in Economics Lecture Room, the President, Wilfred Depow, conducting the meeting.

The gathering was one of the largest ever held by local Pre-Meds. Ridding themselves of the lethargy with which they had been burdened for the past few years, the members present advanced many suitable suggestions.

A committee consisting of Jacobson (chairman), Metcalfe, MacMillan and Clarke was appointed to gather all information relevant to medical requirements of all Canadian Universities.

It was also decided that meetings should be held every second Tuesday, at which prominent figures of medical and biological sciences should address the society. In this connection, a tentative list of speakers was drawn up.

The last item of business was the proposal that all freshman Pre-Med and Pre-Dental students should sign their names to a list to be posted in the near future in the Arts Building.
