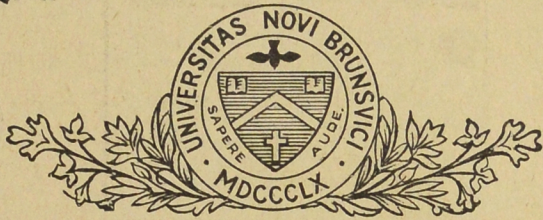

U. N. B. STUDENTS BUY \$500 WAR BOND

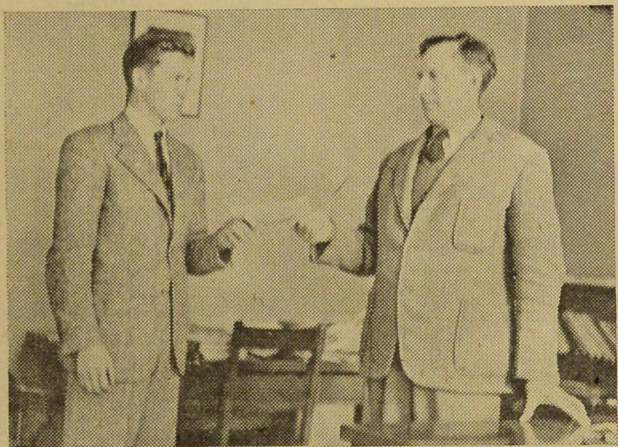
First Term Feature Attraction - Fall Formal - On To - Night

As an aid to Canada's war effort, the students of our University bought a 500 dollar war bond during the Victory Loan Drive just ended. The money realized when this bond matures will be used by the S.R.C. for capital expenditures.

MAJ. JONES CALLS FOR CANDIDATES

Grads, Undergrads Eligible for O. T. C.

All C.O.T.C. Cadets who graduate this year will be given the opportunity to attend an Officers' Training Centre soon after the college year ends, it was announced in an order issued by Major Jones, Commanding Officer of the U.N.B. Contingent, C.O.T.C. Any other cadets who wish to go to O.T.C. are recommended by their Commanding Officer and pass the necessary tests, will be given the same opportunity. Those who wish to have their names included must notify Major Jones by November 17.

After Christmas, the candidates from U.N.B. will take command of a platoon for one or more days. Moreover, they will receive special instruction in such subjects as map-reading and anti-gas. In this way they will be well-grounded in the fundamentals of the Officers' course.

Although the O.T.C. will be unable to handle all candidates at the same time, those who do not go in immediately will be inducted into the Active Force and given status as Cadets or as Officers if they are al-

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HARVESTERS GET C. O. T. C. CREDIT

Colonel Earl Makes Announcement

Queens Journal, Nov. 7 (C.U.P.)

Assurance was received here Tuesday that harvesters would receive full credit for C.O.T.C. hours unavoidably missed on account of the western excursion. This announcement was made following telephone conversations between Principal Wallace and Brigadier La Fleche, Minister of War Services, and Major-General Letson, Adjutant-General, in which the Principal "put the matter strongly before authorities." The C.O.T.C. is now awaiting final detailed orders through District Headquarters.

Officials here commented: "When civilian authorities, universities, and the Department of Labor asked leave of absence this was assured but in military language this doesn't imply total exemption. Colonel Earl first suggested this through regular channels when he inquired for orders by telephone from District Headquarters on October 5. District Headquarters promised to contact Ottawa; but receiving no word by October 13, Colonel Earl

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Alex Cameron Speaks At S. C. M. Meeting

A meeting of the Student Christian Movement was held in the Y.M.C.A. rooms last Sunday evening, with the Vice-President, Ken Dawson in charge.

The regular procedure was omitted, in order to hear the special guest, Mr. Alex Cameron, Secretary of the Fellowship for Christian Social Order.

Mr. Cameron explained the work of the Order, and stated that one of the chief drawbacks toward better social order in Canada was lack of cooperation between the English and French Canadians.
