The basketball budget although high received very little comment. Most of the council members were in favour of giving the boys an opportunity to carve a name for U.N.B.'s basketball players.

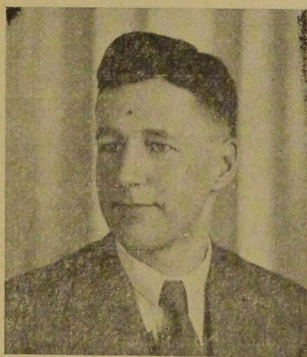
Council members regarded with favour the prospects of having Mart Kenney for the Con.

Rationing At The College; University Leaders Meet

Attempt to Weed Out Incompetent Students

Canada's university leaders at conference in Ottawa have drafted a war-time program for their institutions which, one spokesman said, will result in a "ruthless reduction" in the number of students taking the so-called "liberal arts" courses.

Details of the program were not made public, but it will be subject to alteration as the nations man-power needs change. Thus it is expected to bring virtual rationing of higher education.

University courses will be open only to students prepared to work hard and capable of earning high marks.

Compulsory military training for all men students will be continued on its present basis.

Said Arthur MacNamara recently appointed director of National Selective Service, "At the worst it may be hoped that male students not liable or not fit for military service, female students and a steadily increasing number of discharged men, will maintain the student population at a level sufficient to permit maintenance of staffs and educational standards."

"For the present, however, speaking quite unofficially, I venture the personal conviction that if the universities will ruthlessly weed out the incompetent and mediocre students, if we continue to require that all students take their military training while at the universities, and if it can be understood that, when the requirements of the armed forces or the industrial war effort so necessitate, National Selective Service would be authorized to call up students even though that interrupts their courses, no future restrictions would be necessary."

"In any case, I can certainly assure you that no call up in the middle of an academic year and no basic change in policy will be undertaken except in the common sense way after full consultation with university officials."

Mr. MacNamara described new regulations aimed at avoiding competition of the armed forces and war industries for the services of technical students, under which no person may approach a technical student with regard to service or employment except with consent of Labor Minister Mitchell.

Gunfire Spices Queen's Shindig

KINGSTON, ONT. NOV. 28—As a result of a wound in the right shoulder incurred from a 22-calibre revolver at a Sadie Hawkins Dance in Grant Hall at Queen's University, Betty Stewart, 21, a nurse at Hotel Dieu in Kingston, was removed to hospital. Her condition was said not to be serious, there being no injury to muscle or bone. Police summoned at ten o'clock took possession of the revolver and questioned three students getting signed statements. It was believed the revolver was part of a mountaineer costume worn by a student a propos Sadie Hawkins and left lying on the floor. Another student picked it up, not knowing it was loaded, and fired a shot causing the wound. Names of the students involved and the reason why the gun was loaded were not revealed. Police and university authorities are withholding further details pending an investigation. T. J. Rigney, Crown Attorney, stated "Until the facts are presented in writing there will be no decision whether there will be court proceedings against the student alleged to have fired the revolver but there certainly will be if the facts appear to warrant it."

Next Friday evening, January 22, the University of New Brunswick will again honor its many founders in a celebration to take place in the Memorial Hall. The committee in charge, under the direction of Dr. Bailey, have released plans for an extensive and highly interesting programme which will commence at 8 o'clock. Invitations have been sent to the members of the provincial legislature and the university senate, and a welcome is extended to all friends of the university by the faculty and student body. The Founder's Day address will be delivered by Dr. O. C. Harvey, Curator, Nova Scotia Archives who will be visiting the university for this special event.

A highlight of the program will be the unveiling of the beautiful stained glass windows recently installed in the Memorial Hall by noted friends of the university. Sub-Lt. Colin MacKay '42 will be present to unveil the new window on the right of the Hall, commemorating the life and services of his grandfather, Henry Seabury Bridges, a prominent graduate and one-time Professor of Classics of the University.

The second window, commemorating Sir John Douglas Hazen, will be unveiled by D. King Hazen.

One of the most interesting features of the program will be the annual presentation of quit-rent to His Majesty King George VI which will be received by Lieutenant-Governor W. G. Clark on behalf of His Majesty. This ceremony marks the granting of extensive lands to the university by the British government in the early days of the province.

In addition the Glee Club under the direction of Dr. F. J. Toole will present several selections appropriate to the occasion.

Following the program outlined, a dance will be held under the sponsorship of the Students' Council.

Lectures will be held Friday morning as usual, it was announced by the University office.

Residents To Hold Spring Formal
